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Introduction

Pondicherry is a union territory of India, known as Puducherry and is sharing border with Tamil Nadu. Terracotta making is one of the ancient craft practiced in Pondicherry. In the beginning only traditional pots were made which has been changed over to making decorative objects and household items. The terracotta products are decorated with minute intricate design. Pottery making is famous and significant craft of Pondicherry.

The artists in Pondicherry create excellent range of products using clay. The craftsmen create new designs on the basis of customers/market demand.

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Tools and Raw Materials

The tools and raw materials used for making clay idols are very basic and simple and are available locally. By using these handmade tools the artisan create different varieties of earthen products.

Below are the tools and raw materials:

- Clay: It is one of the major material used for the process.
- Sharp Tools: Sharp edged tools like knives, and blades, which help to carve/create the minute designs and to decorate the idols.
- Molds: Different types of molds are used to create the small idols according to the required designs and patterns
- Furnace: Finished products are placed/ kept inside the oven/furnace for baking.
- Bamboo Sticks: These are used to design the products.

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Making Process

Three types of clay which are mixed together to form the dough are:

- Soft Clay,
- Mud and
- Sand.

The dried clay is thoroughly mixed with water and soaked for the whole night to absorb/soak the water. The next day clay is finely stamped/pressed for more than hour and finally gathered/prepared into a mould. Idols are shaped in to required products with/using hands.

Base is the initial stage of the statue/idols. To form the base, the artisan makes small balls of clay and then they start shaping form. After that they keep on adding coil to form the structure. If the wall of the idol begins to show the indication of weakness, the artisan leave it to dry for a few hours before continue to shape it.

Different varieties of tools are used to shape and design the features of the idols. The surface is smoothened with the fingers with a touch of little water. Idols are left to dry in room temperature for a day then dried in sunlight. A coat of diluted clay slip is applied on the dried idols before baked in the furnace. The statues are baked in a kiln for 2 to 3 hours. The baked articles are colored with vibrant/bright colors to make them elegant and dazzling. Many articles are decorated with glitters to make the products look shimmering.

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

Pottery making has been practiced in India from olden days. The clay crafts made in Pondicherry have wide variety of clay items. The products have huge varieties like home decorative pots, diyas (lamp), idols of gods and goddesses, and deities. The productions of the clay items happen throughout the year but have huge demand during Ganesh chaturthi, Duserrra and Diwali. The naturally made clay products are used for the daily life, special occasions and also decorative purposes. The products are made according to the customers demand.

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
