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Introduction

Kathputli that means a puppet which is made from wood. Whereas the words kath means 'wood' and putli means 'a doll or toy'. The craft of making Kathputli, was practiced by a community of performing artists. The stories that they portray through the Kathputlis have been passed through the words of mouth from parents and grandparents. These performing artists travels from place to place by carrying their portable theatres and entertaining gatherings with the portrayals of the adventures of native heroes in exchange for reward in cash, livestock or a portion of the sponsor's harvest. This form of entertainment became popular with the royal courts, the community people settled in different kingdoms by developing puppets in the image of the ruler, the queen and the members of royal court such as the court dancer, snake charmers, acrobats, ministers and magicians and narrates a story of the king's bravery, kindness and numerous conquests. They are prospered under the benefaction of kings like Vikramaditya, prithviraj Chauhan and Amar Singh Rathod.

Primarily 'Putli Bhats' discovered this art form. Kathputli art form was not only the source of entertainment but also they taught society the social and moral education. The act portrays a major social issues like dowry system, women empowerment, unemployment, poverty and hygiene. The best thing about the act was they just not portrayed the problems but also provided the solution to tackle these problems. A special stage is designed by the puppeteer for the show. Going back in the Kathputli history, the legendary that was created by the first Bhat was based on the livelihood and achievements of the Great King of Ujjain, Vikramaditya. This show involved the act of 32 kathputlis or puppets and the show became remarkable and famous. It was the medium through which they earn their bread and butter.

Kathputlis are the string puppets which are controlled by strings that passes from the top of the puppets and manipulated by the puppeteer. Kathputli involves peppy colours, sharp facial features, dexterous moves, squeaking voices in a typical traditional attire, performing in front of the viewers. Artisan Mr. Ramesh Bhat basically from Rajasthan but he settled in Ahmedabad, who got this unique skill of making Kathputli from his ancestors. He involved in making Kathputli from past 25 years. Artisan not only sell the Kathputlis, he also does puppet shows in various places.

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
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Tools and Raw Materials

- Wooden piece (mango wood) A basic material for Kathputli making.
- Customized tools and chisels Sharp tools and chisels are used for carving.
- Colourful cloth To give a traditional attire and for clothing.
- Needle and Thread These are used to stitch the fabric.
- Scissor It is used to cut the fabric for stitching.
- Waste cotton It is used to fill the body of the puppet.
- Decorative materials Like ribbons, laces and glitters etc., are used to decorate the puppet.
- Oil Paints These are used to enamel the puppet face and neck.
- Round brush It is used to paint the facial features.
- Glue It is used to join the fabric pieces to the puppet.

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Making Process

Kathputli show has been one of the oldest form of entertainment. Kathputli has three main parts, such as head, shoulders and hands. The head and shoulders are made of wood whereas the hands and the body are stuffed with cotton. Mango wood is the basic material for Kathputli making because mango wood is durable. Other than wood it also includes colourful fabric, waste cotton and threads. Initially artisan draw the required design using pencil and then the unwanted is chiseled out using sharp tools and chisels. The facial parts like eyes, sharp nose and lips are carved carefully. The face, neck and head of puppet is carved out of a single piece wood.

The finely carved article is oil painted in light colours like skin colour or yellow colour or white colour and the delicate details of the face like elongated and stylized eyes, sharp nose and lips are done by using thin brush. Fabric is attached to the carved and painted article. A fabric is cut in to pieces and stitched and then the fabric is stuffed with waste cotton to create the hands which are further wrapped and stitched using needle and thread. If the puppet is female, artisan drape a designed fabric on the head and skirt is attached to the body using a strong glue to give a traditional attire. The whole body is covered with bright coloured fabric to give a perfect shape to the Kathputli. Once done with clothing artisan start to decorate the puppet by using ribbons, laces and glitters etc. A string of 40 inches in length is tied to the head to hang.

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Flow Chart:

 Initially artisan darw the required design on a piece of wood. M A K Unwanted portion is removed with the help of sharp tools K and chisels. G H Facial features are carved and detailed carefully. P R U 0 Finely carved article is oil painted using light colours. \mathbf{E} • Delicate details of the face is done by using thin brush. S S Fabric is stuffed with waste cotton to create hands and attached. Ornamenting the Kathputli using ribbons, laces and glitters etc.

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Neem wood is used to carve the puppets.

The basic shape of the face is obtained.

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
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
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














After the fist coat wooden carved idol is kept under sun for drying.
