## **INTRODUCTION**

**THERE** was a group of close friends. Life was mostly fun for them. But sometimes a phase comes in everyone's life when things start changing. The happy go lucky group was no more the same. They were in troubled times. Happiness and sorrow became frequent. No one actually knew whether they were happy or sad. They wanted to know that what they wanted from life. Soon, they had a dream.

A dream where the world was made of stars. Shining, glittering diamond like stars. They were scattered everywhere. The whole scene looked like a fantasy. In the midst of the diamond jungle there were special stars. In each one of them, sat a group member. Sitting in the stars, they were smiling at each other and saying "Everything is fine, everything is alright". I was surprised by the fact that the imagination of our unconscious mind can be so meaningful that it can totally change the way we look at things. I knew that I had to explore dreams as the story line for my project.

We see our memories, our friends, our loved ones, people we know and we fall in love with the wonderland that the brain has created.

Whatever our 5 senses absorb on a daily basis, gets stored somewhere. It stays in our minds and comes in our dreams. It might look different altogether but we know what it means to us.

I have chosen my topic dreams, as narratives, because I want to explore dreams in my film. I think they are an integral part of us, and are very important to us. Most importantly, they are closely related to reality.



## **Synopsis**

A TIME comes in our lives when we find ourselves stuck in the hardest situations and it becomes a painful experience for us. We try our best to find a way out. Some people look for the real answers and some people find an escape in their dreams. They create their own fantasy land where everything they've ever wished for comes true. Reality might break them apart but dreaming keeps them alive. Or they are not yet ready to accept the reality. Many of us are like this and we want to dream about the perfect life that we want; and for it we dream; we dream the reality we dream our conflicts; we dream our memories and we dream for what we wish for. We don't even think of what might happen if our dream breaks? After all dreams are made of the ingredients of what we wish for and what we fear.

My short film "dream: perfect" is a story of a guy who lives in his dreams. He is in love with a girl he can never be with and is unable to bear the pain. Somewhere in his mind he has created the perfect world where he has everything he wants in life. He knows that it can never happen in reality so he dreams about the perfect life he wants with the partner; friend he has loved most in his life.

### **DREAMS**

**DREAMING** is defined as the subjective experience of imaginary images, sounds/voices, thoughts or sensations during sleep. Dreams represent a world of imagery in which our darkest fears, deepest secrets, and most passionate fantasies break out from the unconscious mind and only at this time become present to our own consciousness. There are several key questions that need to be addressed; for instance, "Why do we dream? What do dreams mean? And, where do dreams come from?" The answers to these questions are not that simple; however, recent studies and research has come a long way into divulging the human psyche and what dreams really are.

Dreaming usually occurs in the R.E.M. stage (rapideye movement) of sleep, in which brain activity is high and signaled by rapid horizontal movements of the eyes. Sometimes dreams occur during the other stages of sleep; however, these are much less memorable and less clear. They can sometimes last for a few seconds, or as long as twenty minutes. Dreams are a symbol and link to the inner core of the human subconscious. They can vary from normal and mundane, to surreal and bizarre. Dreams can often times drive creative thought, or provoke a sense of inspiration. Scientists believe everybody dreams, but sometimes we forget. We tend to forget when we naturally pass out of sleep through the traditional cycle. If a person is awoken directly from REM sleep (i.e. by an alarm clock), they are much more likely remember the dream from that REM cycle. Although it's most likely that not all dreams will be

remembered because they occur in REM cycles, which are interrupted by periods of "delta sleep" which in turn have a tendency to cause the memory of previous dreams to fade.

Psychologists have also concluded that our daily activities while we are awake can have an effect on our dreams. However, scientists are unsure as to what degree of an impact this makes, it is nonetheless substantial enough. It is also possible to intentionally direct dream content; this is called lucid dreaming, because the person is aware of dreaming while the actual dream occurs.

## FACTS ABOUT DREAMS

**DREAMS** are fascinating experiences. Man has wondered for centuries about dreams and what dreams mean. There has also been much research into dreaming –when it occurs, why we dream what we do, etc. Here are a few facts about dreams:

- 1.Researchers have discovered that each of us have at least four or five dreams a night.
- 2. People who have been blind all their lives still dream. But, their dreams are formed based on their four other senses (touch, smell, taste, and sound).
- 3. One of the earliest forms of dream analysis was performed by the Romans. Dreams were often submitted to the Roman Senate for interpretation. The Romans thought their dreams were messages from the gods.
- 4. The average dream lasts between 10 and 15 minutes.
- 5. If you awake right after REM sleep, you may be able to recall your dream more vividly than someone who has slept through to the morning.
- 6. You cannot be dreaming if you are snoring.
- 7. The five most common dreams are that of falling, being chased, our teeth falling out, being back in school, and your

spouse cheating on you.

- 8. A 1980 study showed that 42% of people felt they had had a dream about something that later came true.
- 9. Dreaming is necessary. If people are prevented from dreaming, they can suffer from personality disorders and psychological problems.
- 10. Humans are not the only ones who dream. Many animals dream and scientists believe that all mammals dream.
- 11. Studies have shown that as many as 70% of all females and 65% of all males have had reoccurring dreams.

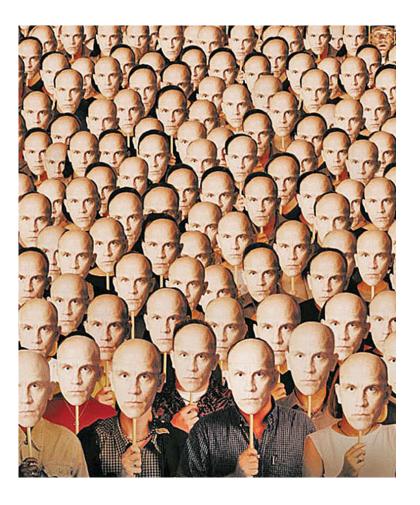
## APPROACH TO CONTENT

### Eternal Sunshine of a Spotless Mind

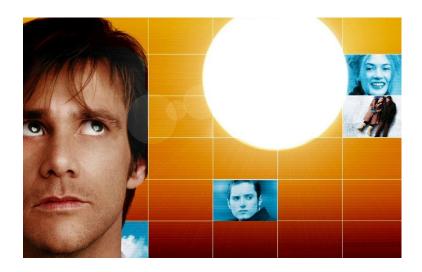

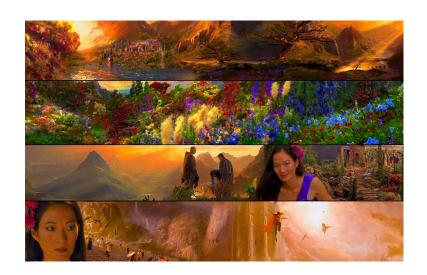

Following the death of his father in Mexico, Stéphane Miroux, a shy insecure young man, agrees to come to Paris to draw closer to his widowed mother Christine. He lands a boring job at a calendar-making firm and falls in love with his charming neighbor Stéphanie. But conquering her is no bed of roses for the young man and the only solution he finds to put up with the difficulties he is going through is escape into a dream world.



Director: Darren Aronofsky

The Fountain is a 2006 American science fiction/fantasy film directed by Darren Aronofsky that follows three interwoven narratives that take place in the age of conquistadors, the modern-day period, and the far future. The film stars Hugh Jackman and Rachel Weisz, whose characters' romance exists in all three time periods. The Fountain explores the themes of love and mortality, drawing influences from the The Fountain of Youth and The Tree of Life. The film is framed with visual language by using transition scenes, light, and shapes.





### Films by George Melies

He was very innovative in the use of special effects. He accidentally discovered the stop trick, or substitution, in 1896, and was one of the first filmmakers to use multiple exposures, time-lapse photography, dissolves, and handpainted colour in his films. Because of his ability to seemingly manipulate and transform reality with the cinematography, Méliès is sometimes referred to as the "Cinemagician." His famous films The Eclipse and A Trip to the moon are science fiction films made at that time. These are considered to be some of the most important early science fiction films, although their approach is closer to fantasy.

#### Circular Ruins

Jorge Luis Borges

"The Circular Ruins" (original Spanish title: "Las ruinas circulares") is a fantasy short story by Argentine writer and poet Jorge Luis Borges. An experienced wizard retreats from the world to a location that possesses strong mystical powers: the circular ruins. There, the wizard tries to create another human being from his own dreams. But finally he understands that he too is a mere appearance, dreamt by another." The story also seems to symbolize writers as creators who engender one another and whose existence and originality would be impossible without their predecessors.

# *The Interpretation of Dreams* Sigmund Freud

Freud observes that, while scientific opinion has come to dismiss the idea that dreams can be interpreted, "popular opinion" has "stubbornly" held on to the notion that dreams do indeed have meaning. He asserts that, contrary to the reigning scientific opinion, he will prove that it is possible to interpret dreams using a scientific method

He explains that dreams have an "ulterior motive" whereby their meaning is other than it appears on the surface. He proposes a method by which a patient is encouraged to relax the normal impulse to "censor" unwanted thoughts

to more easily call to mind the associations that the dream evokes. Freud refers to this state of mind as "uncritical self-observation"; the process was later called "free association."

Freud then proceeds to analyze a dream of his own by isolating its separate elements and describing the amalgam of personal associations that cluster around each element. He concludes that this dream "represents a certain state of affairs as being as I would wish it to be."

Freud's fundamental conclusion about dreams is that "wish-fulfillment is the meaning of each and every dream, and hence there can be no dreams besides wishful dreams." Further, dreams are not meaningless but are in fact "constructed by a highly elaborate intellectual activity."

# The History of Dreams in Ancient Cultures Internet

I found internet as a helpful source of information for my topic. I surfed through the various sites connected to dreams and for the kind of information related to it. It was a useful source as I came across many articles related to it. I read this interesting article on the importance of dreams in ancient cultures, their thoughts and visions on dreams. It talked about dreams in Egyptian culture, Greek mythology, The Babylonians and the Hebrews. The Egyptians were great believers in dreams and their powers and influence. The Dream Book is a papyrus that contains dream examples and dream interpretations and it is believed to date back to the early reign of Ramesses II. The Greeks also believed in good and bad dreams and the process of inducing dreams and visions. The Babylonians believed that good dreams are sent by the gods and the bad dreams being sent by demons.

# *René Magritte*Painter

René François Ghislain Magritte (1898 – 1967) was a Belgian surrealist artist. He became well-known for a number of witty and thought-provoking images. When I saw this painting I was awestruck by the mystery element in it. Each and every painting of his was based on falsity of representation. The paintings I liked the most are:

The Treachery of Images, famous for its inscription this is not a pipe. The picture shows a pipe that looks as though it might come from a tobacco store advertisement. Magritte painted below the pipe: "Ceci n'est pas une pipe" (This is not a pipe), which seems false but is actually true. The painting is not a pipe, but rather an image of a pipe.

**Golconda** is an oil painting on canvas in 1953. The piece depicts a scene of identical men dressed in dark overcoats and bowler hats, who seem to be floating like helium balloons (though there is no actual indication of motion), against a backdrop of buildings and blue sky. It is humorous, but with an obvious criticism of the conventional effacing of individuality.







### Conclusion

**READING** about dreams and watching movies enlarged my view and understanding of my chosen subject. It contributed immensely towards the construction of my ideas which were initially quite simplistic. And irrespective of the work on the story line, I became aware of the human psyche behind dreams. ### Concept4

We all wish for certain things in life and dreams are perfect to fulfill our wishes. This concept was about a person who wanted to be somebody else in his dreams. By showing various states of his mind in the abstraction and combining his desires, I thought of making it a narrative.

### Concept5

I thought of making the whole plot as a thriller. So this concept is about a person who tries to solve a murder case in dreams. Dream becomes a map for him which finally leads the story to the end. But was it a thriller I had in my mind when I chose the topic as dreams in my project? I had to be true to myself and make a story, which is close to my heart.

### Concept6

This is a story of a guy who is in love with a girl. In reality he can't be with the girl so he arranges a perfect dream to be with her. In the film, it is shown that in reality this guy is repeatedly arranging things in order so that everything falls in place for the perfect dream. This concept is based on the theory that if we see things continuously for a long time then they are bound to come in our dreams. But problem with this story was I was trying to make it logical by proving a theory in the film. So I changed the story to make it more true to what I want to tell in the film.

#### **STORY**

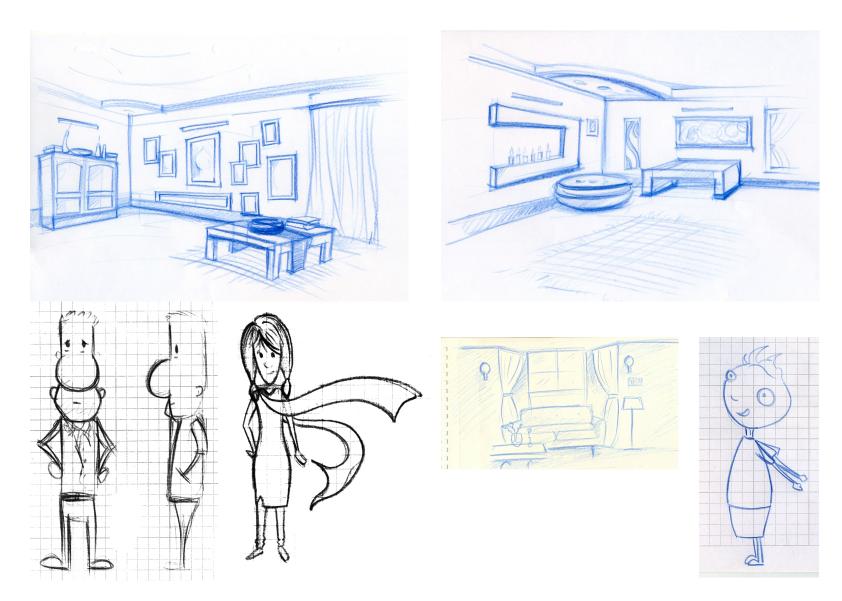

He looks outside the window and look at the dark clouds. He takes his hands outside to feel the rains. Suddenly all grey clouds disappeared and the sky became full of colors; and he saw Riya. Beautiful as she is; smiling and looking at him with her eyes full of affection for him. This is the world of his dreams where he wants to be. But suddenly everything disappears and the music has stopped. Abir goes and plays the disc again.

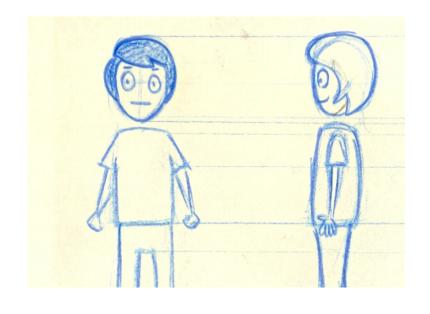

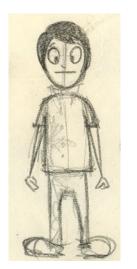








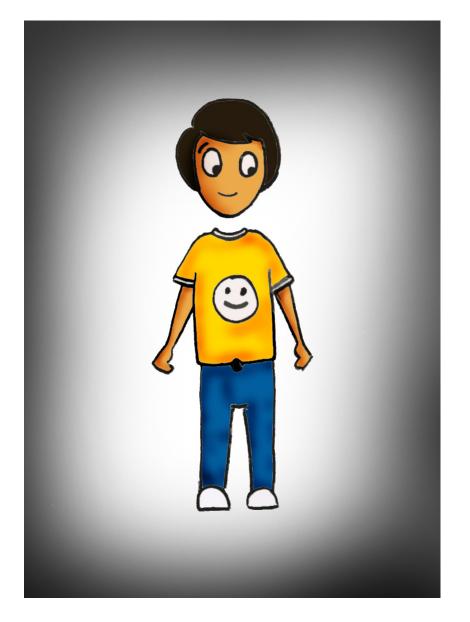








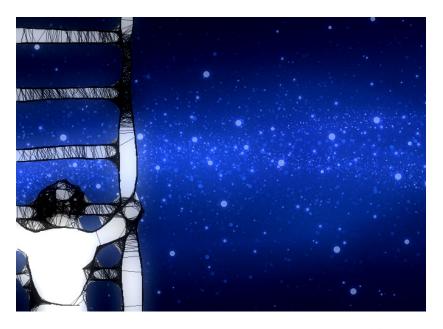


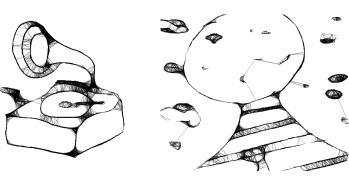






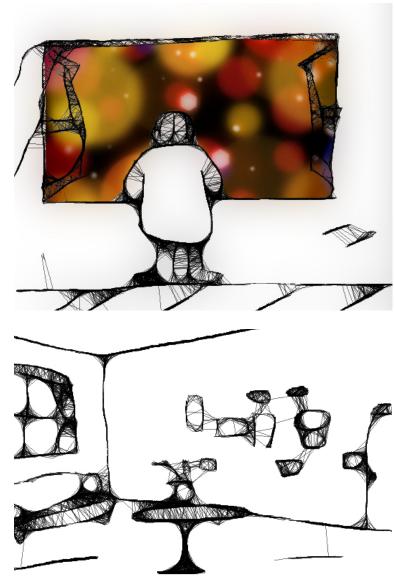
























### FINAL APPROACH

**THE** film has majorly two contrasting sequences which have been treated differently in terms of colours and texture. The sequences which depict real life have been given a gloomy look. They are dark and sad because the character in these sequences is lonely and depressed. Textured paper, scanned in high resolution, has been used as the background in the animation. Shadows and higlights have been prominently rendered in the objects to give a three dimensional effect.

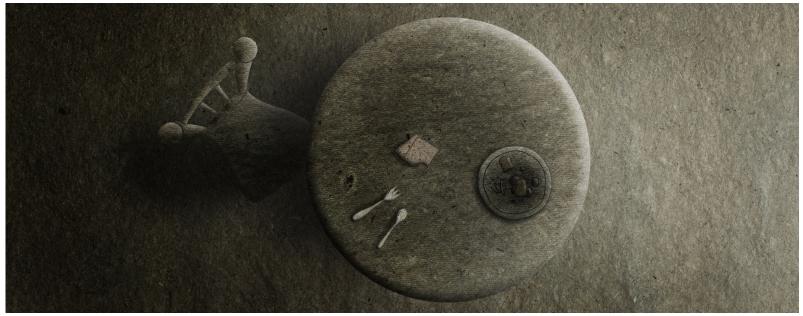

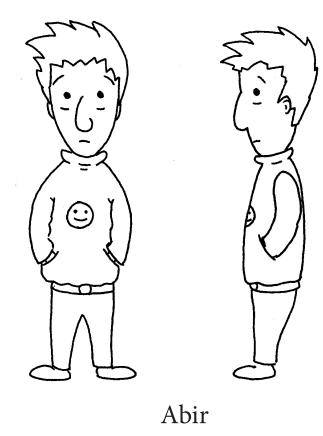
### **CHARACTERS**

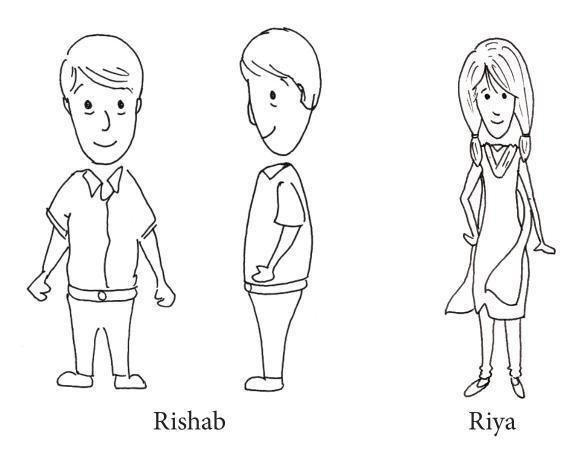
**THERE** are three main characters in the film, Abir, Riya and Rishab.

## SOUNDS AND EDITING

I WANTED to create the "lost and lonely" effect for my film. So I have used various free sounds to create the required environment. Background music is chosen accordingly to suit the style of the storytelling. Sound editing and mixing is done using Cool Edit Pro.

As the environment created is dark and grey to produce the feeling of loneliness, editing is done accordingly. There are long shots used in the film for the similar reasons. So for editing I have used parallel cuts, fast cuts and fades according to the mood of the scene. Editing is done using two softwares, *Adobe After Effects and Adobe Premiere*.

## **EPILOGUE**

**THIS FILM** is an attempt to bring out something that is close to my heart. The journey was full of highs and lows but I have learnt a lot in the process. Sometimes simple stories are most difficult to tell and I have tried hard to bring out the best from me. I have always wondered about existence of dreams and how it affected the reality.
