Defining Handicrafts:

Definition According to United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization/ Information Technology Community (UNESCO/ ITC) International Symposiumon "Crafts and the International Market: Trade and Customs Codification", Manila, Philippines, October 1997: Handicrafts can be defined as products which are produced either completely by hand or with the help of tools. Mechanical tools may be used as long as the direct manual contribution of the artisan remains the most substantial component of the finished product. Handicrafts are made from raw materials and can be produced in unlimited numbers. Such products can be utilitarian, aesthetic, artistic, creative, culturally attached, decorative, functional, traditional, religiously and socially symbolic and significant.

Definition according to Govt. of India:

Handicraft can be defined, which is

made by hand; should have some

artistic value; they may or may not have

functional utility.



Handicraft Industry at a glance in 2015-16

The total export of handicrafts from India is expected to nearly double to US\$ 2.7 billion in FY 2015-16 and further increase to US\$ 3.8 billion by FY 2020-21. The Indian Handicraft Industry is one of the largest employment generators and accounts for a significant share in the country's exports. The Indian handicrafts industry is fragmented and unorganized, with more than 7 million regional artisans and more than 67,000 exporters promoting regional art and craftsmanship in the domestic and global markets. In 2015–16, Indian handicrafts exports stood at US\$ 4.5 billion, up approximately 15.4 per cent over the previous year's exports. Exports of Indian handicrafts have increased at around 16.4 per cent since the last five years. Indian handicrafts are exported to countries like the US, the UK, the UAE, Germany, France, Latin

American countries (LAC), Italy, the Netherlands, Canada and Australia. US alone accounted for approximately 26.1 per cent of India's total handicraft exports in 2014–15. It was followed by the EU, which accounted for approximately 24.7 per cent. The UAE was the third-largest importer of Indian handicrafts, with imports worth US\$ 410 million in 2014–15.

Being a producer of bamboo, handicrafts made from bamboo are one of the eco-friendly crafts in India. The varied items made from bamboo are baskets, dolls, toys, chalani, furniture, mats, wallhangings, umbrella handles, crossbows, khorahi, kula, dukula, kathi, jewellery boxes and many more. Cane products, a famous form of Indian handicraft, include utilitarian objects like trays, baskets, stylish furniture, etc.

For Cane: Jati, Tita, Lejai

Items



Bone & Horn

Originated in the state of Odisha, the bone and horn handicrafts are famous for creating birds and animal figures, which seem real and alive. Besides, goods like pen stands, ornaments, cigarette cases, table lamps, pepper and salt sets, chess sets, napkin rings, laughing Buddha etc. are prepared in Odisha, Karnataka, Kerala and Uttar Pradesh.

Crafting of Horn and Bone Crafts
Horn and Bone Crafts of Southern India are
manifestations of a series of complicated and
elaborate steps. Initially the horns and bones are
soaked in water and are heated to make them
soft to carve them in desirable shapes. Engravings
are done on them with intricate designs and are
coloured with vivid hues. Polishing with charcoal,
coconut oil and limestone is the final step in their
processing.





Clay work

The origin of clay crafts in the country dates back to as early as the Indus Valley Civilisation. The Indian states of Himachal Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, West Bengal and Rajasthan are renowned for their diverse form of clay crafts. The terracotta crafts of West Bengal, 'kagzi' or paper pottery made in Alwar region of Rajasthan and 'khurja' pottery of Uttar Pradesh are quite popular. During the Sultanate period in Delhi and Uttar Pradesh, India proceeded with its own manufactory of blue pottery.

Types of Clay: Earthenware, Stoneware, Kaolin.

Tools used

In addition to the potter's hands, tools includes paddles, anvils & ribs, and knives, fluting tools and wires specifically for cutting or piercing.

Gems & Jewellery Craft

The Gems and Jewellery sector plays a significant role in the Indian economy, contributing around 6-7 per cent of the country's GDP. One of the fastest growing sectors, it is extremely export oriented and labour intensive. India is deemed to be the hub of the global jewellery market because of its low costs and availability of high-skilled labour. India is the world's largest cutting and polishing centre for diamonds, with the cutting and polishing industry being well supported by government policies.

Most Famous: Rajasthan and Delhi are known for meenakari and enameling. Pearl jewelry is common in Maharashtra and Andhra Pradesh. Gold and silver jewelry is common to most regions of the country. Silver predominates most of the traditional jewelry of the tribals.





Leather work

Leather crafting is the practice of making leather into craft objects and items of daily needs using shaping and colouring techniques. This craft shares an ancient connect with the Indian Culture. Leather artifacts have been found on site of the Indus Valley Civilization, the earliest settlement on the subcontinent. Texts such as the Vedas indicate the use of animal hide and show sages and ascetics using deerskin for meditation. Leather Crafts have since bedecked millions of households.

Most famous in India -

Rajasthan: decorated leather items

West Bengal: decorated products with traditional

designs and geometric patterns. Kashmir:

ornamental leather products

Madhya Pradesh: embroidered red leather

Gwalior, Indore, Bilaspur and Dewas: shoes, jutties,

Andhra Pradesh: leather toys and puppets



Types of Metals Gold, silver, bronze, brass, copper and bell metal






Stone Work

The art of sculpture is the poetic expression of stone craft. Sculptures of deities, decorative for house interiors, modelled on classical prototypes, continue to be made in every nook and corner of India. In the interiors of India such sculptures and exquisite figures are carved in relief with details engraved in fine lines. These objects are handmade artistic work made using hammer and chisels. Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, Orissa and Rajasthan are well-known centres of production of beautiful stone crafts.

Types of Stones Sandstone, Soapstone, Granite, Marble

Tools used

Hammers and chisels of various shapes and sizes, local names as 'Muna', 'Patili', 'Martual', 'Thuk-Thuki' and 'Nihana'. An electric grinder is used at times, to quicken sanding and filing.





Wood Work



Basic tools are carving knife, a gouge, the chisel, a mallet, V and U shape tools and grained or sand paper.







