
Govandi as a neighborhood

Her generous spirit and unwavering determination to uplift her community have earned her the nickname of Parveen Apaa. Whenever she speaks, she fills the room with an incredible positive energy that can move even the hardest of hearts.

Despite her tough exterior, I discovered that she's also one of the most caring and loving people I've ever met. Every time we crossed paths, she would ask about my well-being and whether I had eaten. One of my fondest memories was when she invited us over to her home for a meal of delicious biriyani. We all sat together like one big family and enjoyed the mouth-watering biriyani, prepared by her maid. It was an experience I'll never forget.





Parveen Apaa is held in such high esteem that you can see the respect in the eyes of every child and elders in the community. I've witnessed Sana, Tayyaba, and Affan, all of them at the community library, cower in fear if they ever think they've done something wrong in her presence. Parveen Apaa is always present, overseeing the progress of events and providing help wherever necessary. One time, when we were trying to make sticky dough from flour to paste posters, nobody knew how to do it. Parveen Apaa quickly jumped in, instructing and scolding us for how kids these days are too preoccupied with their mobile phones. She even shared how she learned to make it as a child, earning 1 or 2 rupees by pasting posters of political rallies.

Her life has been filled with experiences that have shaped her into the wise and powerful personality that she is today. Through her struggles for survival and fight for rights, she has gained a wealth of knowledge that allows her to confidently stand in front of thousands of people and deliver speeches that leave a lasting impact. As someone who prides themselves on their identity, I sometimes find myself hesitant to express it in fear of judgment from others. But after meeting Parveen Apaa, I was ashamed of my own apprehensions. She proudly embraces her roots in Govandi, and firmly believes that even in places where people lack basic facilities, talent can thrive and bring about change. Everywhere she goes, she speaks with pride in Hindi, stating that if your words carry weight and value, the listener will make the effort to understand, and there's no need to adapt to anyone else's preferences.



Kush Kumar


