



ART AND ITS ROLE

When you look at a work of art you may quickly decide whether you like it or not. but have you even wondered why some appeal to you more than another? there is no definitive answer to this question, but if you can start by understanding how and why the artist created the piece, you will appreciate and enjoy it more.

Looking at art and explaining how to read work of art more thoroughly and understand what the artist was trying to achieve. The section also introduces the language of art so that you gain the vocabulary to analyse what you see. As you begin to develop an informed sense of why you like some works of art more than others the experience of looking at art will become more meaningful and enjoyable.

When you look at a work of art the first question to ask is what it is about. Once you have established the content, you can consider how the artist has arranged the elements of the piece, the composition.

Whether the image is of people, landscape, still life, or abstract, it has to work as an integral whole, in which the various pictorial qualities such as colour, light and shape also play their part.

Art Now and Then

Since the Stone Age, painters have been forced to move with the times. Prehistoric artists painted with lumpy pigment crayons and pads of moss, before upgrading to brushes made of vegetable fibre and animal hair. For colour pigments they used three varieties of clay ochre and charcoal for black.

By the time of the Middle Ages, artists had developed both encaustic and egg-tempera painting methods, and were soon to explore the lustrous advantages of oils. New colour pigments came and went, as did a series of paint containers and colour charts. Lastly, during the 1940s—about 32 millennia since

the first cave paintings. Chemists devised fast-drying acrylic paints. But despite all these developments in the art of painting, painters still had to draw their own images. Now, things are changing. Digital and computer art is upon us, which means that anyone with any proficiency in software design programs can produce a drawing at the drop of a hat. And life drawing is now seen by many as an old-fashioned and unnecessary waste of time. Unfortunately, when artists stop learning how to draw, figurative art flies out the window, and video art takes over.

VISUAL CULTURE AND PUBLIC ART

Visual Culture

The word Visual is relating to seeing or appearance, any item or element depending on the sense of sight and “Culture is defined as a social domain that emphasises the practices, discourses and material expressions which over time express the continuities and discontinuities of social meaning of a life held in common.” so Visual culture is the form of culture expressed in visual images.

Visual culture is concerned with visual events in which information, meaning or pleasure is sought by the consumer in an interface with visual technology. By visual technology, I mean any form of apparatus designed either to be looked at or to enhance natural vision, from oil painting to mobile phone and the internet. It can include Photography, video game, comic, traditional artistic media, painting, sculpture, installation, graffiti, advertising, public art and any other medium that has a crucial visual component.

Public Art

Public art is an art in any media that has been planned and executed with the intention of being staged in the Physical public domain. It is a reflection of how we see the world – the artist’s response to our time and place combined with our own sense of who we are. Its size can be huge or small. Its shape can be abstract or realistic (or both), and it may be cast, carved, built, assembled, or painted. It can be site-specific or stand in contrast to its surroundings.

What distinguishes public art is the unique association of how it is made, where it is, and what it means. Public art can express community values, enhance our environment, transform a landscape, increase our awareness, or question our assumptions. Public art is a reflection of how we see the world – the artist’s response to our time and place combined with our own sense of who we are. Most of the public art which has existed

from Antiquity consists of various types of stonework like funerary monuments, statues and other religious or architectural sculpture. Today, however, the category of public art includes a huge range of works from the fine, decorative and plastic arts. As well as architecture and sculpture, it includes painting, stained glass, ceramics, mosaics, and tapestry, as well as numerous forms of contemporary art, such as Earthworks, Assemblage, installation art and performance.

Public Art in World

In America , cities and towns are almost in direct competition of being the city, the place to be where people want to live, visit and yes, where they spent their money. People chose their homes, by how unique the city is, it is important what our towns look like and it is important to have a certain community identity that allows us to feel safe, wanted and happy.

Strong public ART expressions break the fear of sameness and blandness and give neighbourhoods a stronger sense of belonging somewhere and a better sense of identity which creates loyalty and a stronger, more productive working force.

We normally identify with cities or better we only remember places, that have their own icons , that have created their own landmarks they are known for . We remember Los Angeles by the Hollywood sign, Paris by the tour Eiffel and San Francisco by the Golden Gate Bridge . Cities create dreams, we all want to be part



of, All of these monuments were created by very creative people who captured the spirit and atmosphere of their home towns. Without ART, without public ART, we would loose our human identities .

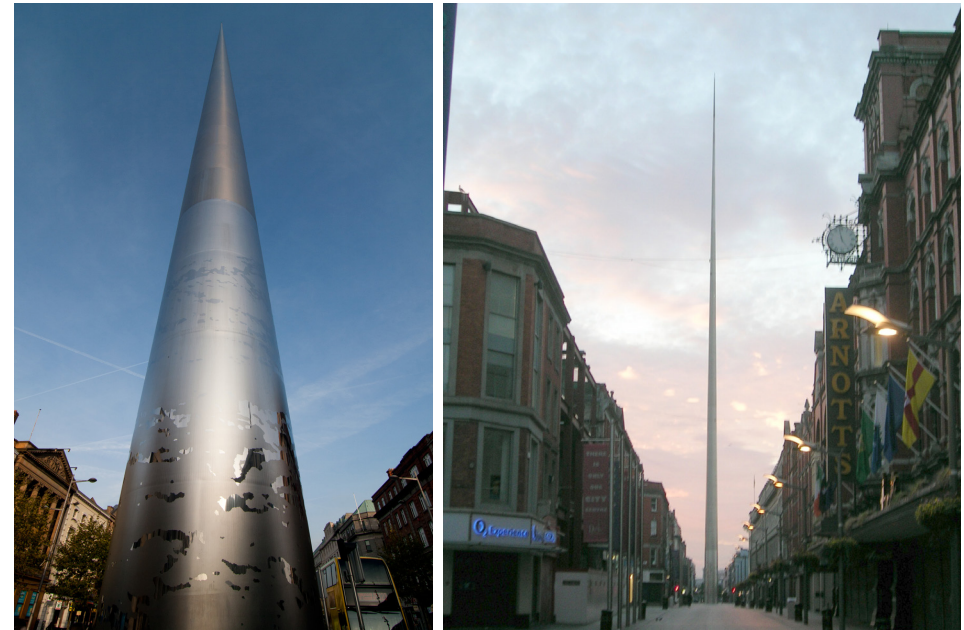
Planet (Singapore):

Cloud Gate (Chicago):

Cloud Gate is a public sculpture by Indian-born British artist Anish Kapoor. It is at Millennium Park in the Loop community area of Chicago, Illinois. Constructed between 2004 and 2006, the sculpture is nicknamed The Bean because of its shape. Made up of 168 stainless steel plates.

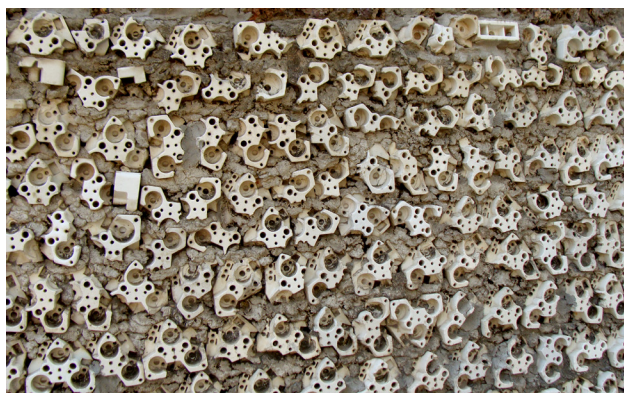
Rock Garden:

The Rock Garden of Chandigarh is a sculpture garden in Chandigarh, India. The Rock Garden has been designed as an open-air exhibition hall using urban and industrial wastes by Nek Chand, a former Road Inspector in Chandigarh. It is also known as Nek Chand's Rock Garden after its founder Nek Chand, a government official who started the garden secretly in his spare time in 1957. Today it is spread over an area of 40 acres. It is completely built of industrial and home waste and thrown-away items.

When I was studying at Chandigarh I frequently visited this place and spent time to see the work. In this garden various type of sculptures made up of broken glass bangles, china ware, discarded fluorescent tubes, clay and coal dot the premises can be seen. Walls of terracotta pots and the maze of paths, canyons and chambers display the great creativity. There is also a 14 chamber with a waterfall, puddles, statues of animals and birds. The Rock Garden is one of the prime attractions of Chandigarh.

Sprouts:

While I was travelling on the AIIMS flyover for an interview this year in Delhi, I saw these public sculpture by Vibhor Sogani. These giant steel balls sprinkled across the greens near the AIIMS flyovers in Delhi. After coming back to Mumbai I was searching about the work then finally it come out with the man behind the mystery Vidbor Sogani.

Sogani has been dabbling in installation art, catering mostly to private clients. Sprouts is his first public work, spread across the six acres of greens between the AIIMS flyovers in Delhi. There's a story behind these giant steel balls "We wanted to make a statement about India," says Sogani. "The Commonwealth Games were coming up, the cityscape was changing and everyone wanted to make the city look good. Sprouts is symbolic of the feeling that India is rising. Sixty years of Independence is nothing in a nation's age. We are a nascent nation. So we're still sprouting."

Nupi lan Memorial:

Unlike many other Indian states, the women in Manipur always enjoy a special status in society and have always taken an active role in shaping the history of Manipur. Nupi Lan –which means women's war in Manipuri- is an important movement in the history of Manipur. The Manipuri women folk waged two historic wars in 1904 and 1939 against mass exploitation and artificial famine triggered by the British imperialists.

For this historical movement Manipur government took the initiative to create a memorial complex. This sculpture allows people to experience it every day about the Nupi Lan and it reflects who we are and those mothers who were fighting for us. From my early age I have seen this sculpture and it given me to consider about my career in sculpture. Now I can create these type of figurative sculpture but I always wondering how it was made and who create it.

Dandi Memorial:

In 2005, Prime Minister Dr. Manmohan Singh had announced a countrywide project called National Salt Satyagraha Memorial at Dandi, Gujarat. IIT Bombay has been charged with the responsibility to design, coordinate and implement the memorial project.

A memorial to mark the historic Dandi March led by Gandhiji with 80 selected marchers in March 12, 1930. A visual depiction of the main event which occurred during the 24 days journey. In this project artists from countrywide participated to create the life size sculpture of the 80 marcher.

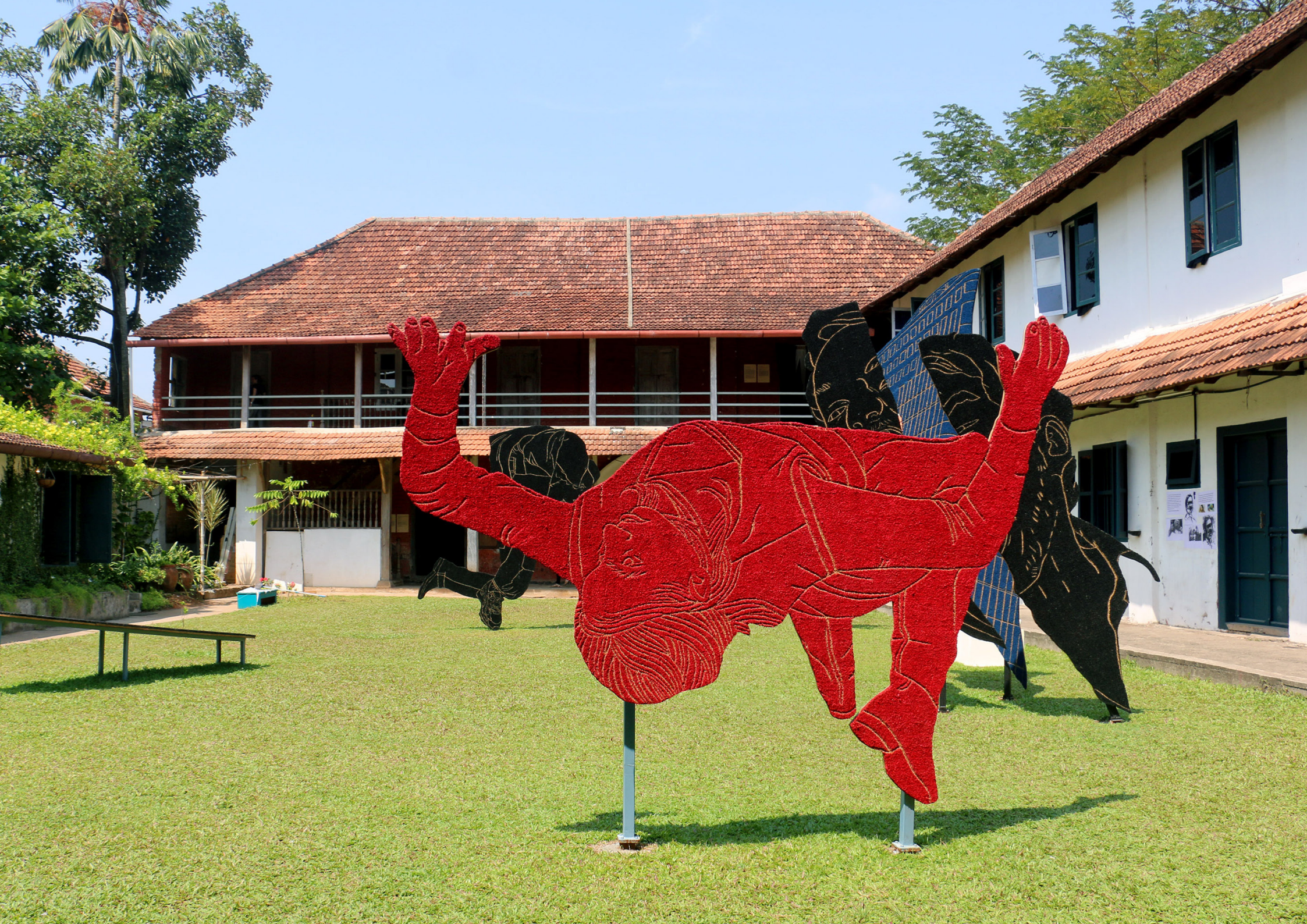

The Kochi-Muziris Biennale is an initiative of the Kochi-Biennale Foundation with support from the Government of Kerala . The exhibition is set in spaces across Kochi, Muziris and surrounding islands with shows being held in existing galleries, halls and site-specific installations in public spaces, heritage buildings and disused structures.

Hyderabad Sculpture park:

When I was in Hyderabad for Dandi Memorial project I went to a village called Shilparamam. It is an arts and crafts village located in Madhapur, Hyderabad. A rural set-up to give you a feel of ethnic Indian amidst the busy capital city of Hyderabad.

In this place an arts and crafts exhibition hub, in the form of a village set up. The main idea behind the establishment of the village was to create an environment for of a village for the locals and provide the traditional artisans a stage to exhibit their art. The place also hosts ethnic festivals all year round. Shilparamam, the famous crafts village in Hyderabad was set up in the year 1992. The place is right in the heart of the state capital, just a few kilometers from the hustle-bustle of the city. Inside this village there is a

sculpture park with lots of artist works. The concept of a sculpture park is itself very new in india. And for a fact, the sculpture park at Shilparamam is the first of its kind in the country. Open air spaces that are conceptualized and created specifically for the outdoor presentation of sculpture are very common in the western countries.

Public Art in Mumbai

Dabbawalas:

An art installation dedicated to the city's iconic dabbawalas was unveiled at Haji Ali. The statue, which is made of steel and is about 11-foot tall, has been sculpted by city-based Valay Shende, and is funded by Goenka's RPG Art Foundation.

Mumbai Dabbawalas have been delivering food in Mumbai to offices and homes since the longest time and have earned heaps of praises for their On Time Delivery every time. General secretary of the Mumbai Dabbawala Association, Subhash Talekar said, "We have been serving Mumbai for 126 years and have put in a lot of hard work and labour to ensure that tiffins reach our customers on time. We are grateful for the honour."

Ambedkar and Shivaji Maharaj:

Since 2015 I was in Mumbai I have seen mostly two sculpture one is Dr Ambedkar and other is Shivaji maharaja.

The estimated cost of the proposed grand memorial of Dr. BR Ambedkar at Indu Mill in Mumbai has gone up from Rs 425 crore to nearly Rs 900 crore even as the construction of the memorial is yet to begin. Reason: Inclusion of a giant bronze statue of Ambedkar — a 350-foot tall structure which will be called the ‘Statue of Equality’ — to mark the contribution of the Dalit icon’s fight against social injustice.

Narendra Modi, on Saturday, laid the foundation stone for the Rs 3,600 crore-grand memorial for Shivaji Maharaj off the Mumbai city coast. The 192-metre statue of Chhatrapati Shivaji is expected to be completed by 2019. The 192-metre statue of Chhatrapati Shivaji is expected to be completed by 2019. Rs 3,600 crore is a huge amount. Not just as a standalone figure, but also in comparison to what the Maharashtra government has allocated as budget, in more essential sectors. It's seven times the budget for building new rural roads and fixing old ones. It's five times the budget for the state's electricity generation projects. And it is an amount that could have easily restored 300 heritage sites all across Maharashtra.

The state government is planning to build a mega memorial for Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj in the Arabian Sea, off the Mumbai coast. The main feature of the Shivaji memorial, slated to cost Rs 3,600 crore, will be a 192-metre-tall statue of the iconic Maratha king. The site is a rocky outcrop, roughly 1.5 km from the Raj Bhavan shore.

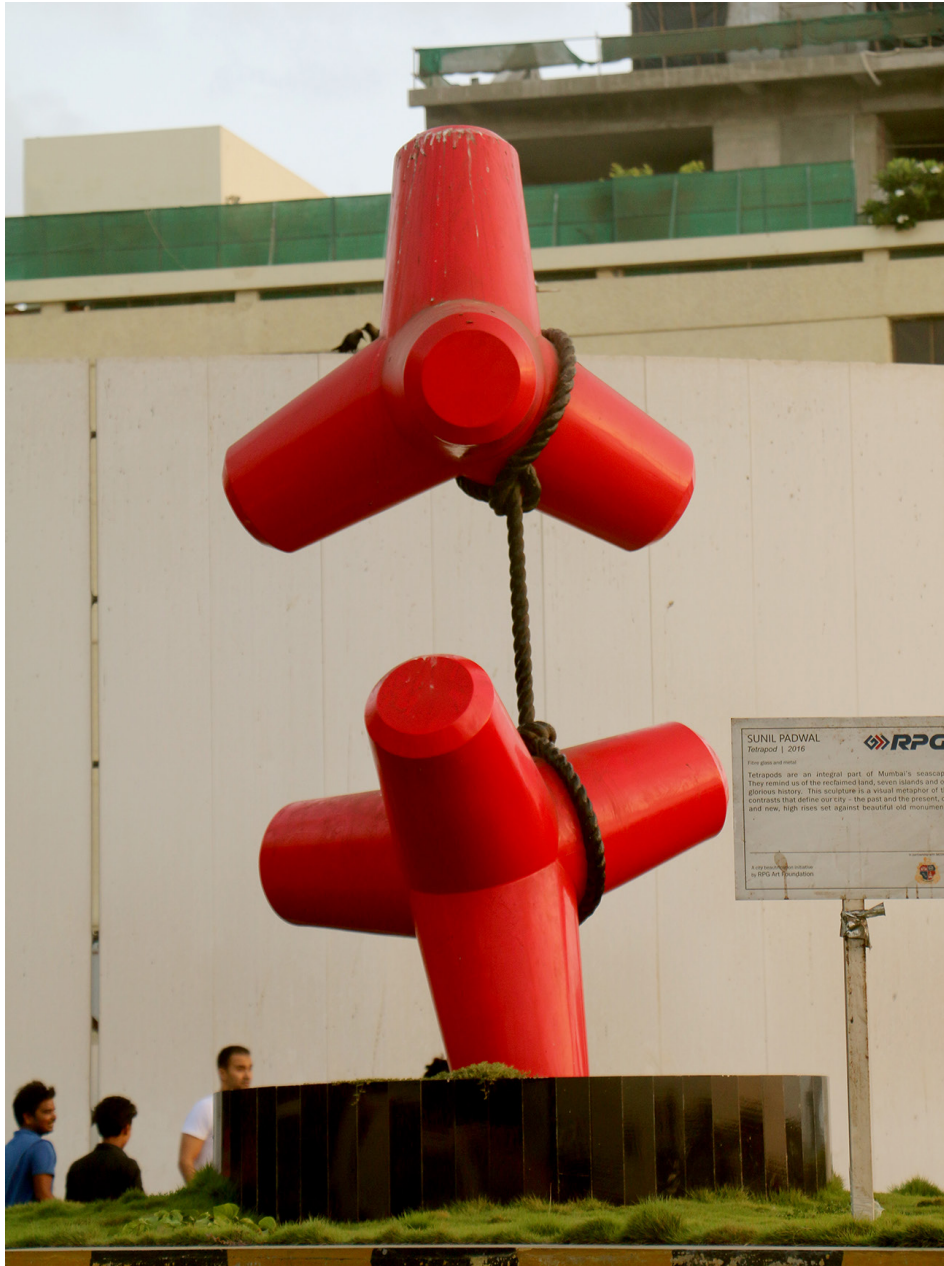
Flora fountain:

Flora Fountain, also known as 'Hutatma Chowk' since 1960. It is a famous landmark that finds mention in the list of heritage structures across India. Western India's Agri-Horticultural Society built it in 1864. It has been named after Flora – Roman Goddess of Flowers. In 1960, the Flora Fountain was renamed as Hutatma Chowk (Martyr's Square) in the memory of 105 people who sacrificed their lives while demanding a separate Maharashtrian state.

Marine Drive:

Marine Drive (officially, “Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Road”) is a 3km long, six lane concrete road in southern Mumbai which stretches north along the coastline, forming a natural bay. This C-shaped road links Nariman Point to Babulnath, and is situated at the foot of Malabar Hill. Known world over as Marine Drive. These are called tetrapods. A tetrapod is a tetrahedral concrete structure used as armour unit on breakwaters. A tetrapod’s shape is designed to dissipate the force of incoming waves by allowing water to flow around rather than against it, and to reduce displacement by allowing a random distribution of tetrapods to interlock. You will find them in many coastal areas, protecting the nearby buildings and landmarks.

Importance

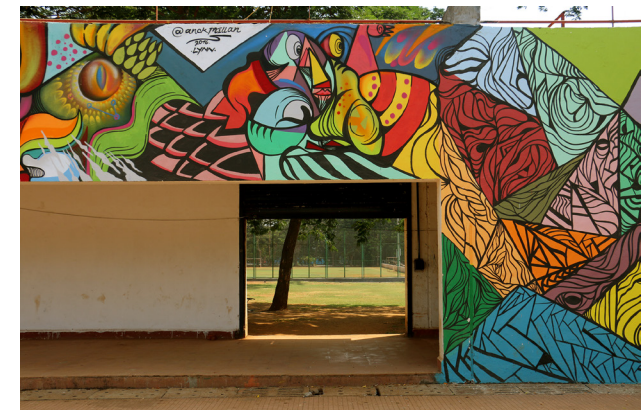

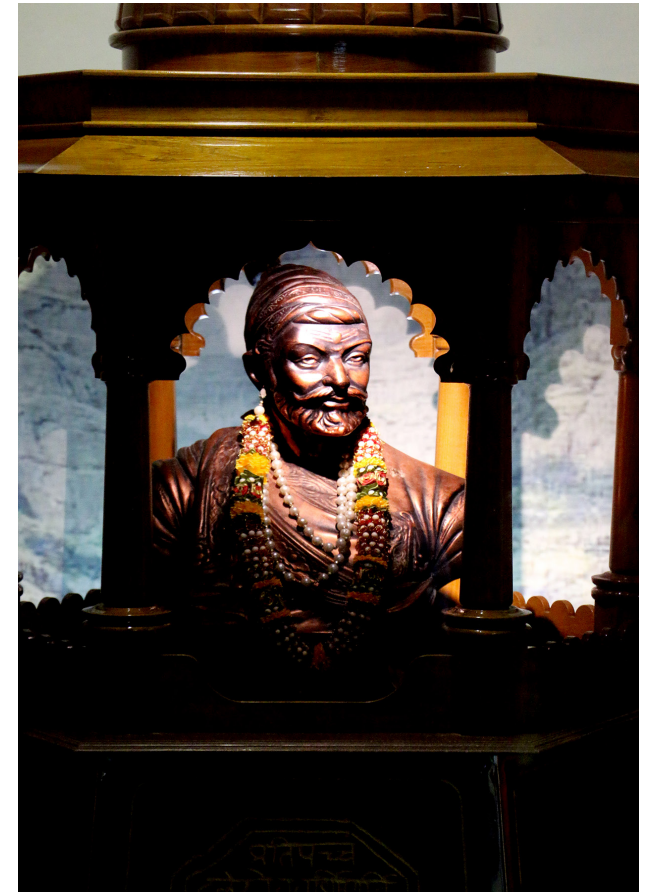

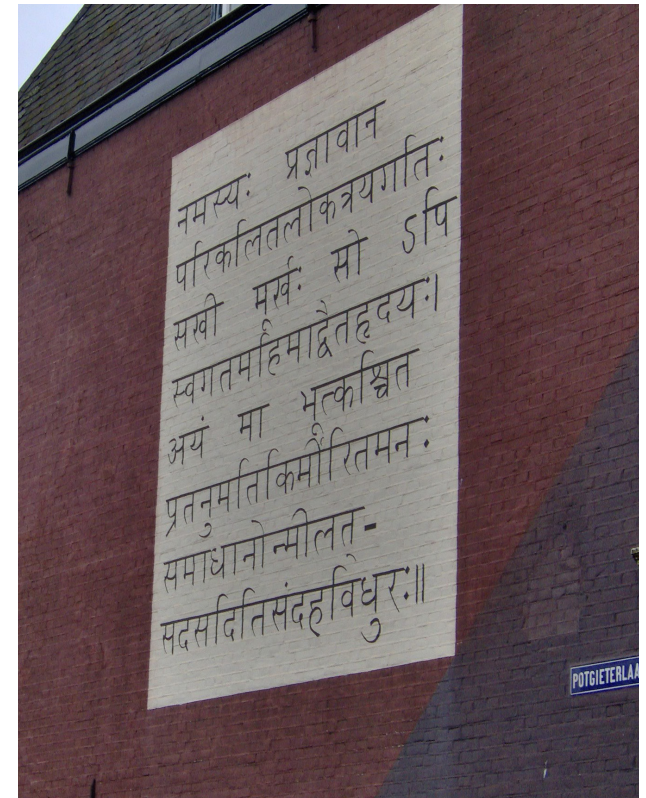


Through Words:

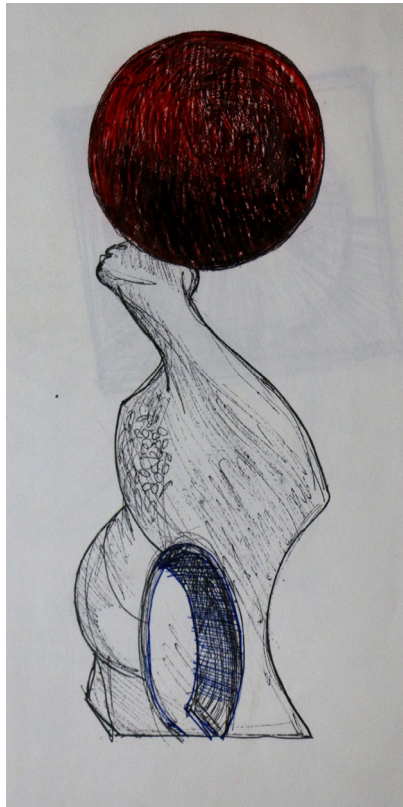

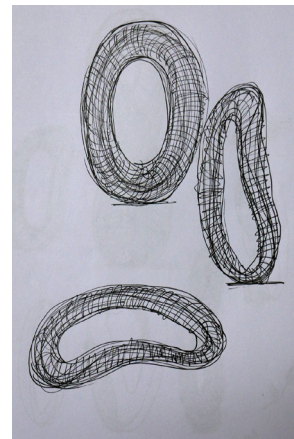
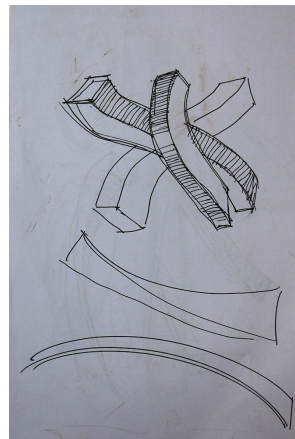
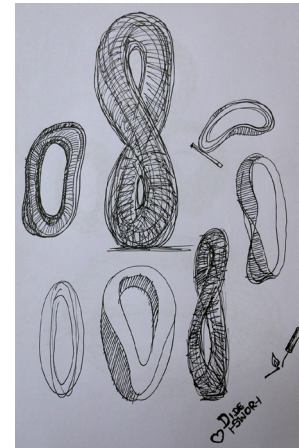
Final concept

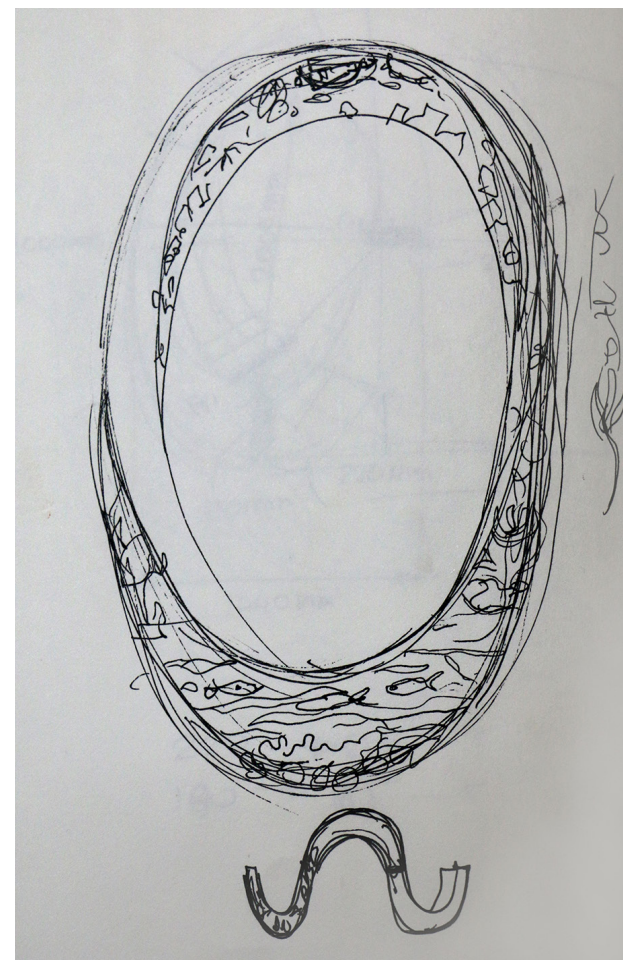
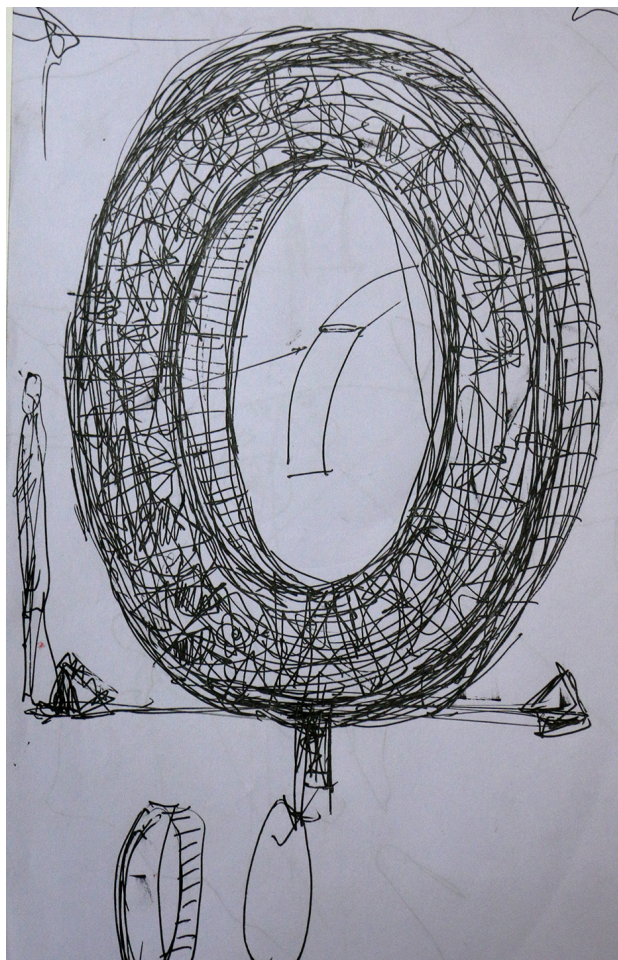
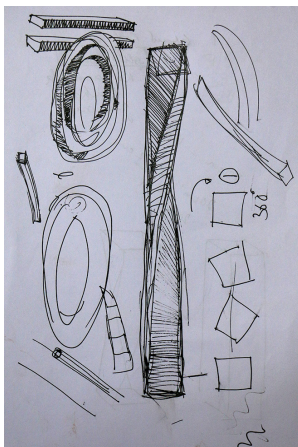
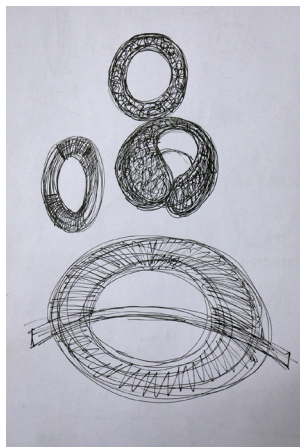
Zero:

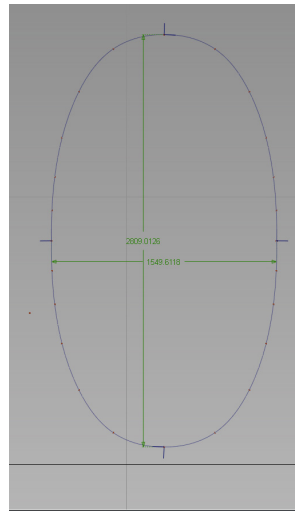

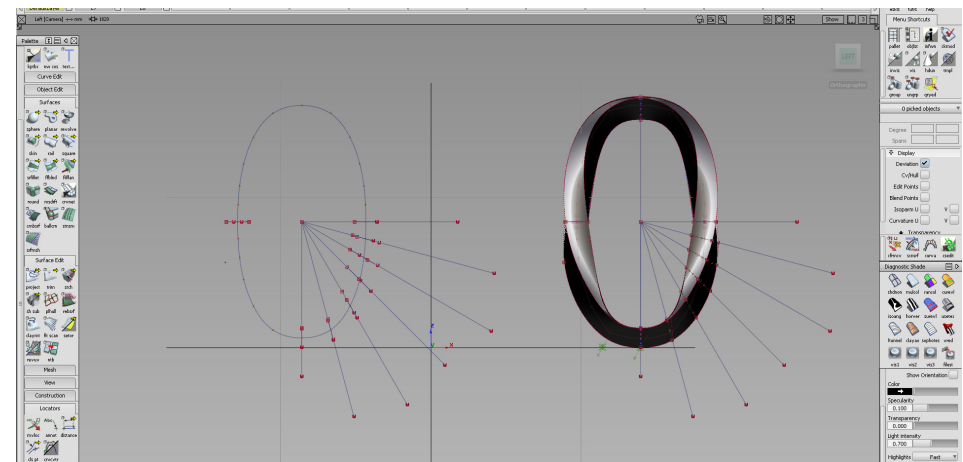
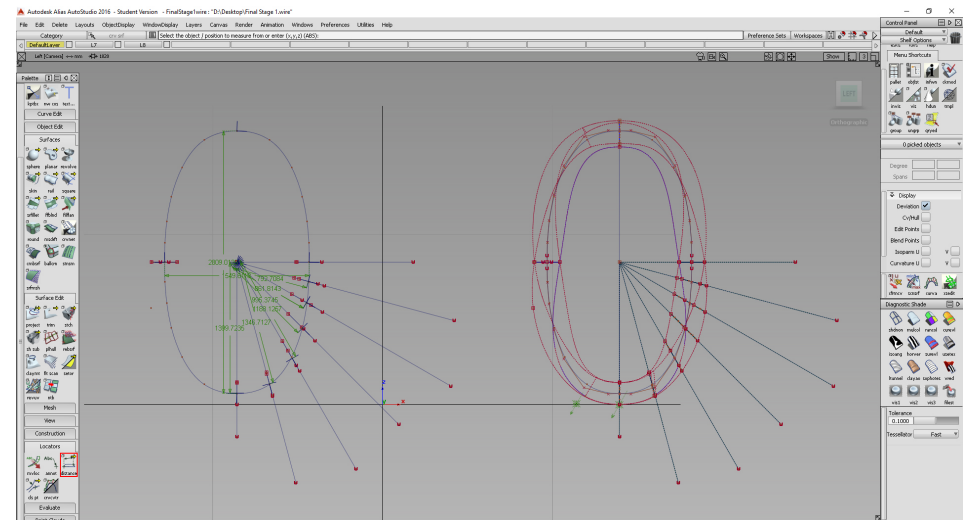
Process:

After finalise my concept with my guide I start sketching several form. I start with simple shape of zero. Then make some changes with the form of the zero a little bit twist. Finally came out with two twisted form. Then make maquette of this 2 forms. After selecting one form with the help of my friend we are preparing for a digital 3D model in laptop. By using AutoCad Alias software we are making a digital model. It make me easier to calculate the dimension of the Sculpture. With the ratio of the maquette we enlarge into 15 feet height and 9 feet width which is quite large.

The model is ready but I need to understand how to make it. Need to know what will be the total cost including material, fabrication, installation and maintenance. It will be very difficult to fabricate at IDC. With one of my friend who is working in metal we went to Gulalwadi to understand the cost of the material and fabricator. No want is not ready to work



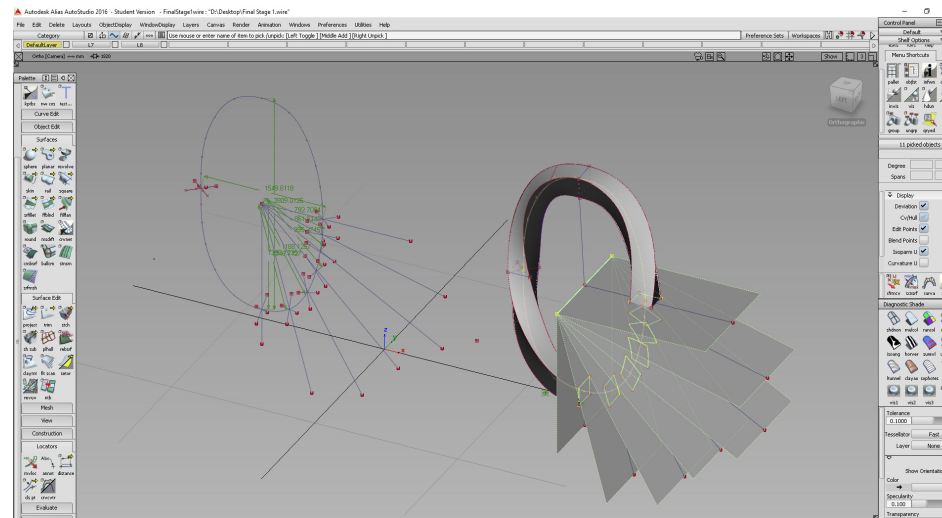

luckily we meet a fabricator Raju Bhai. He asked a charge of 2.5 Lakh for fabrication and material. But it is out of our budget as our budget is only 1 lakh.

Only option came was either rise more fund or reduce the size of the sculpture. I discussed with my guide regarding this. Finally some fund also rise and reduced the size of the sculpture 10 feet height and 6 feet width. And started working with Raju Bhai at Gulalwadi, Grant Road.

As the medium of this Sculpture is in Stainless steel which is new a medium for me. The height of the sculpture is 10 feet and width of 6 feet. It is golden opportunity to make a 10 feet height in Steel. I started with a simple zero structure and the front side will be creating a composition of flora and fauna. On the backside of the sculpture will depict the technology things. By analysing different possible forms, finally

come out with the twisted zero. In this we can see both flora- fauna and technology in both front- back. So here in this digital model the black portion will be pattern of Technology and Nature.

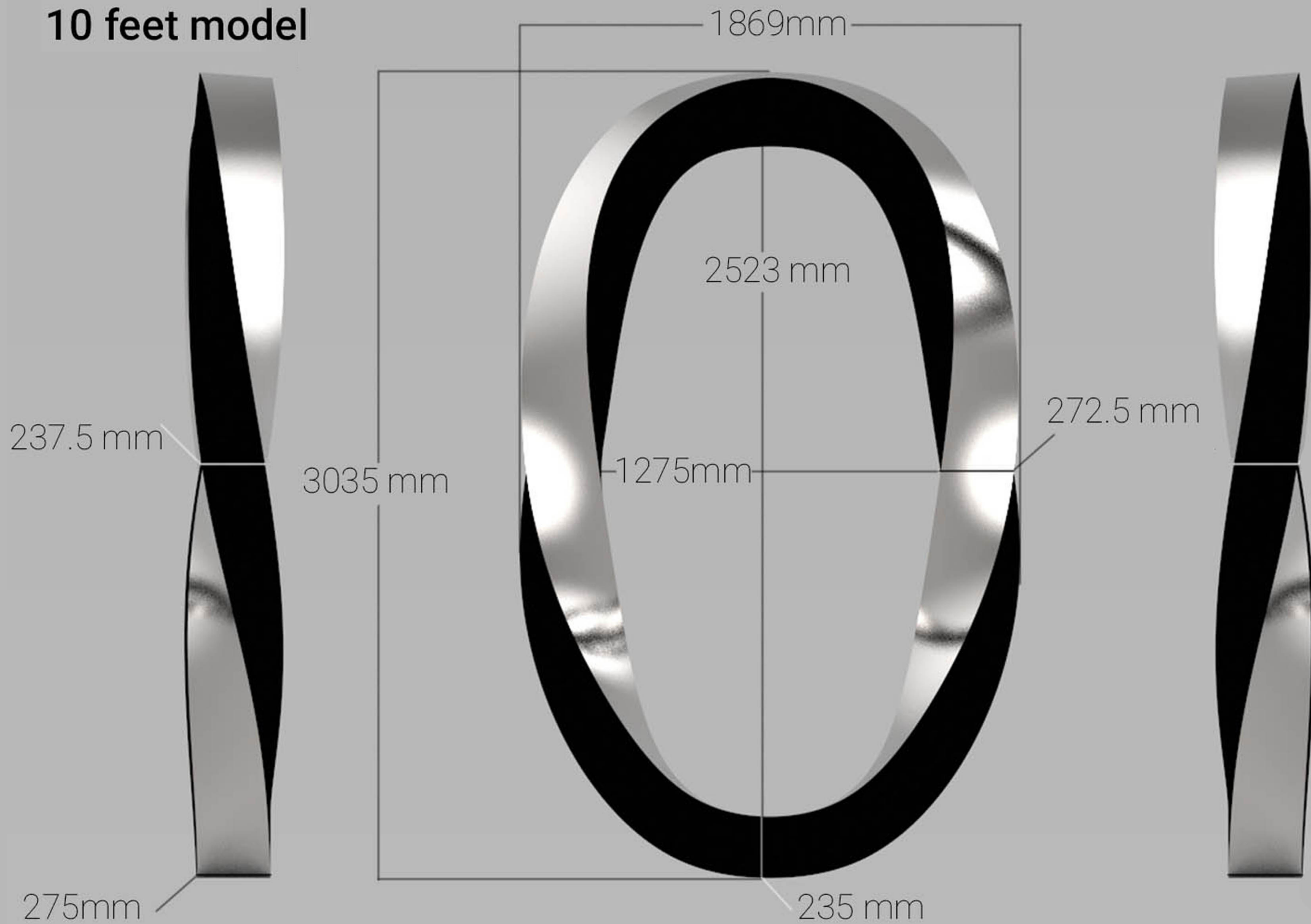
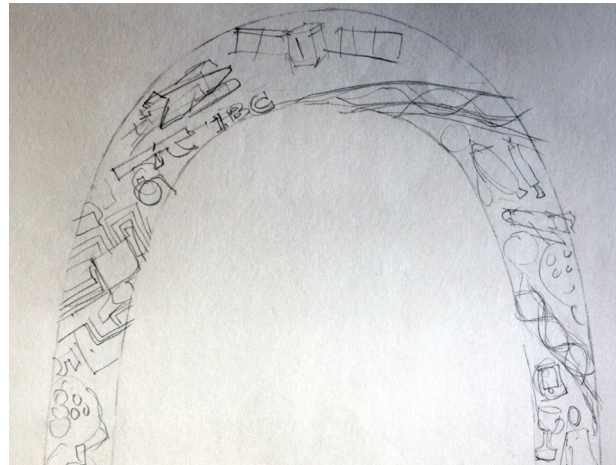


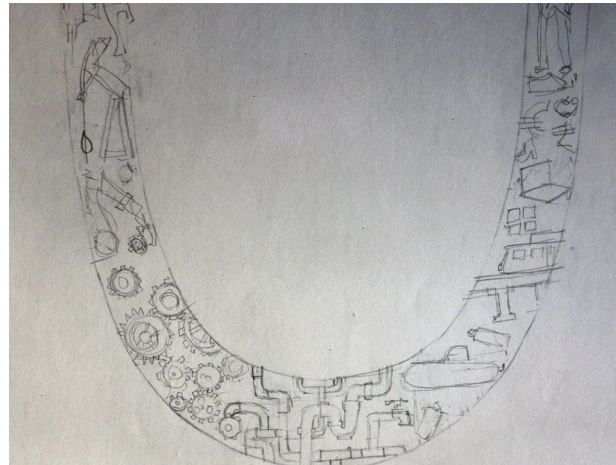

Illustration for the pattern which is to fixed in the black side of the sculpture model. It is to be cut in laser cutter. It is also a difficult

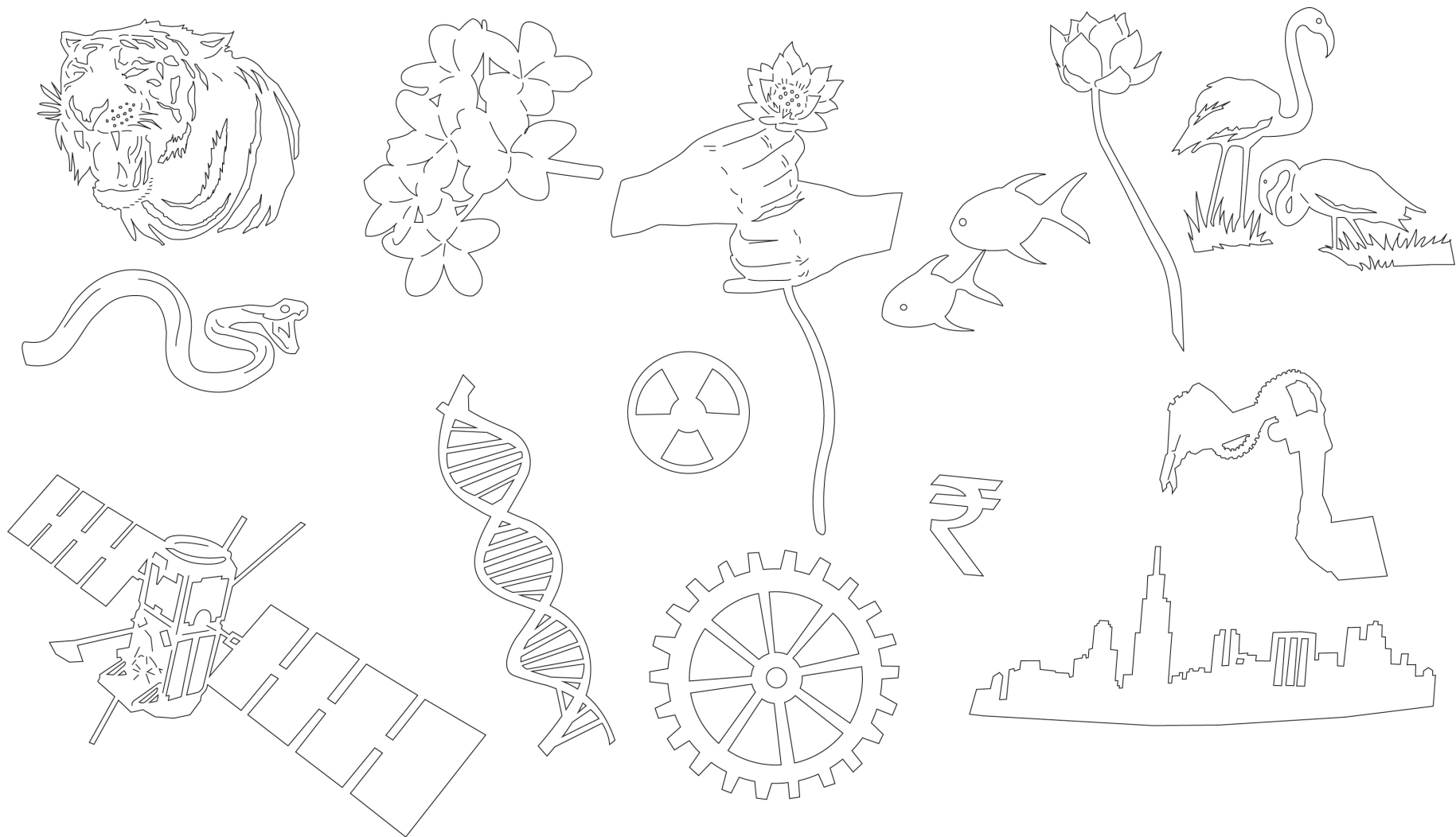
task to do illustration in accurate size. So first I did the drawing of some objects related to the nature and technology.

Fabrication process:

I went every day to the workshop of Raju Bhai at Gulalwadi, Grant Road. We at first make a zero shape mockup model with a proper measurement. It is rotatable and can twist in any form. After that the metal sheet had been added with according to the form of the mockup. It is vert hard to band the sheet but final ready the metal surface. And then the structure had been added then finally the pattern had been welded.

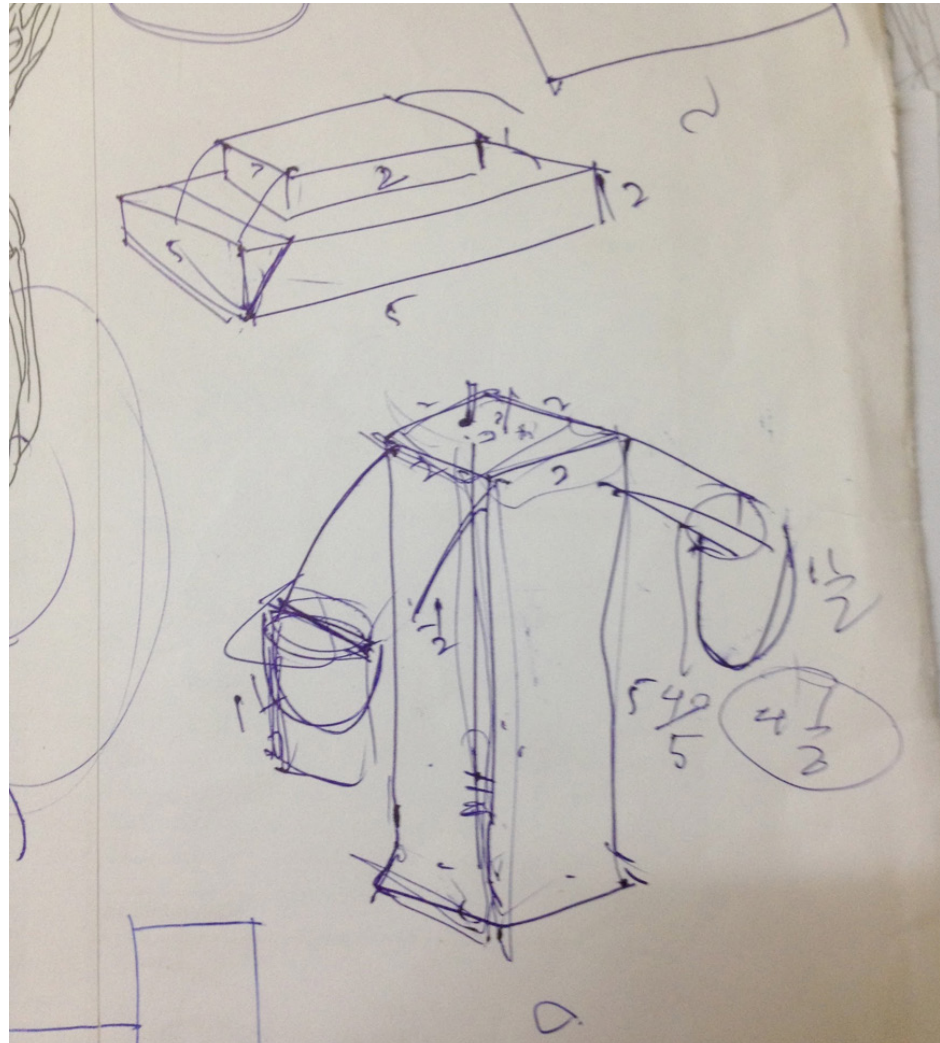
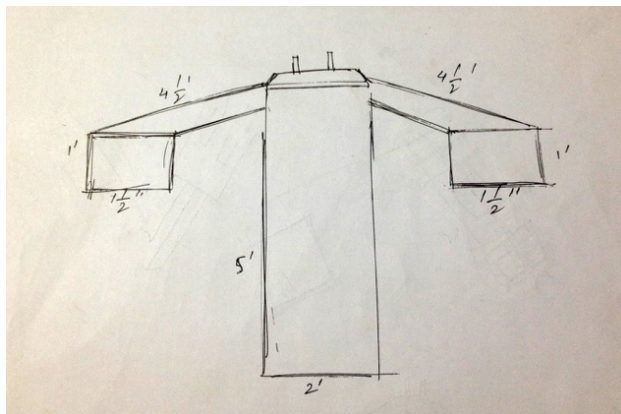

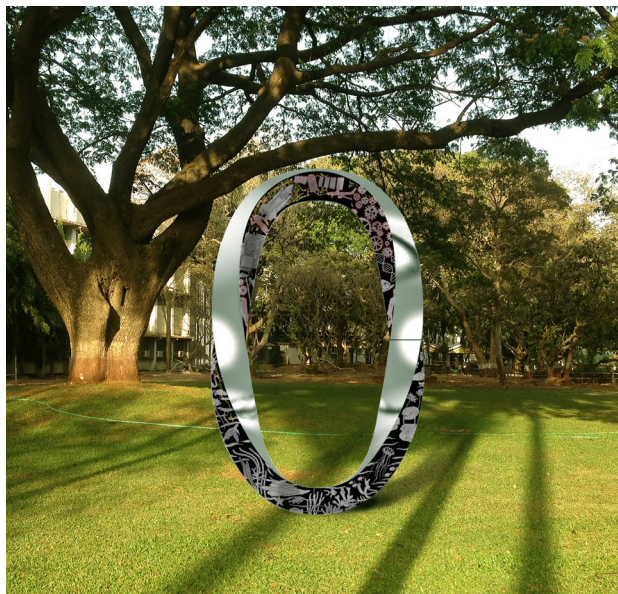
Foundation process:

As per size of the Sculpture I have to prepare the foundation. The size of the foundation should be 5 feet depth of 2 feet square cement block. On the side of the block 2 square cement block of 1 feet and 6 inch square of 1 feet had been made.
