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
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Introduction

Illustration

- The act of illustrating something.

In visual communication, an illustration is a visual aid used to communicate ideas, concepts, instructions or processes. It is a combination of art and information that aids or complements data. An illustration as opposed to a text explanation can improve perceptibly and thus help the viewer understand the topic better.

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

They are used in print and digital, media and publishing in various forms like posters, flyers, magazines, books, teaching materials, animations, video games and films.

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Applications

Illustration design is a field that incorporates both function and form in various blends based on its application. The various forms of illustrations include:

• Fashion Illustration

In the field of fashion design and apparel production, illustrations are used for three main purposes.

- 1. To document existing clothing trends.
- 2. To conceptualise new garment ideas.
- 3. To make detailed technical sketches called 'Flat sketches' with exact measurements used for creating garment manufacturing standards.

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
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• Technical Illustration




In comic books as well as graphic novels, illustrations are used to narrate the story along with text. E.g. - Ajanta paintings, cartoons

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Decorative

Illustrations are often used in decorative forms in India. Even though the form of the illustration may not signify a direct meaning but there are several cultural and intangible messages depicted in decorative illustrations of India.

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History of Illustration (Timeline)

Since the advancements in technology built the various styles and approaches to illustration, the story of how illustration grew in India also can be traced back to these advancements.

• 9000 BCE

The earliest illustrative drawings to be found in India go back to Bhimbetka Cave Paintings. Cave walls and stones being the favoured surface and paint used with hands representing basic forms from nature became the very first example of 'illustration' in India.

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• 3300 BCE

Indus Valley Civilisation emerging in the northwest part of India developed into the first organised settlement. This period saw the development of art, economics, language and architecture all of which had to be documented and recorded. Thus the Indus Valley script was developed. These symbols in the form of seals were applied in many ways, including carving, chiselling, painting and embossing and the seals themselves were also made of many different materials, such as soapstone, bone, shell, terracotta, sandstone, copper, silver and gold.

• 2500 BCE

Pots and clay were a popular choice to decorate with illustrations in the Indus Valley Civilisation. Red based pots were painted over by black paint to add further graphics on the pots for decorative purposes only. Red pottery with red and black slip-painted decoration - Indus Valley.

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• 2600-2000 BCE

Metals like gold, silver, brass, bronze, iron and tin, copper were used as printing materials too, incised with mirrored images and text.

• 15th to 6th century BCE

In southern India, palm leaves tada or tala or tali were widely used for writing manuscripts. Rig Veda itself contains many illustrations accompanying the texts, handwritten on birch bark or palm leaves.

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• 5th century BCE

Buddhism not only urges the devout to hear, learn, remember and study the text but to obtain a good copy and to preserve it. This 'cult of the book' led to techniques for reproducing texts in great numbers, especially the short prayers or charms known as dharanis. Stamps were carved for printing these prayers on clay tablets from at least the seventh century, the date of the oldest surviving examples.

• 3rd century BCE

Ashokan Pillars were used by emperor Ashoka for Buddhist documentation and spread of religion. Pillars and temple walls depict the life of Ashoka.

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• 2nd century BCE to 1st Century CE

Ajanta Frescos was created during the Satvahana empire on cave walls.

• 3rd Century

During the Gupta Period art and craft in north India reached its peak. Textiles woodblock printing on textiles emerged as a major craft. Wooden blocks were also used for writing.

• 6th to 7th Century

Chalukyas Art craft reaches its zenith and temple architecture flourishes.

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• 7th Century

During this time literature in various parts of India exploded. Paper, invented in China was introduced to India in 7th century by Chinese prisoners from Samarkand but was not in popular use. During this time The Palas of Bengal pioneered miniature paintings.

• 9th to 13th Century

Coins and temples are illustrated with the life of the Cholas. Scenes from Ramayanam Mahabharatam, Puranas and lives of the 63 Nayanmars are sculptured in narrative panels. The Cholas excelled in the art of portrait making. The best specimens of portraits are found on the walls of various temples from the Chola dynasty.

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
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• 12th to 16th Century

During the Mughal Period of Turks and Mongols, Akbar nama/Ain-i-Akbari, A chronicle of Emperor Akbar is commissioned by Akbar Himself and written by Abul Fazl. At least 49 different artists contributed to illustrating the stories in the form of Mughal miniature paintings. Apart from Painting on paper and Architecture, Mughals also patronise 'Kalamkari', an art form of illustrating on textiles.

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• 16th Century

The first printing press in India reached Goa, in 1556, from Portugal. In 1568, the first illustrated cover page (the illustration being done with the relief technique of woodblock) was printed in Goa for the book 'Constituciones Do Arcebispado De Goa'.

• 1706 - Bartholomaeus Ziegenbalg, a Danish missionary, arrived at Tharangambadi and printing in India could flourish again.

• 17th Century

During the East India period, Chamba Rumal craft originated, developed and flourished in the erstwhile state of Chamba.

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
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• 18th Century

The Hastividyārnava, an illustrated manuscript of Assam was written by Sukumar Barkaith, commissioned under the patronage of King Siva Singha and his queen consort Phuleswari. The manuscript deals with the management and care of elephants in the royal stables.

Oriental scenery by William and Thomas Daniell (1769-1837), printed in monochrome and individually stained in coloured ink became the first example of single sheet printing on a large scale in India. The first magazines were published by the British. The earliest to appear was the Oriental Magazine; or, Calcutta Amusement (1785–86).

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• 1816 - The first printed illustrations of engravings by an Indian artist were by Ramachand Roy for the book Annadamangal. Published by Ganga Kishore Bhattacheryee, a journalist, teacher and reformer, it was printed at the Ferris and Company press of Calcutta.

- 1822 Credit for the first single sheet lithographic print goes to the French artist De Savignac. He made a lithographic reproduction of a portrait of Warren Hastings, first Governor-General of Bengal, after an original painting by George Chinnery.
- 1824 The Government Lithographic Press was established in Calcutta in 1824 leading to the printing and publishing of lithographic illustrations.
- 1850 The Madras School of Art is established in Madras

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- 1854 School of Industrial Arts in Calcutta is founded.
- 1861 The Archaeological Survey of India was founded, leading to extensive documentation of Indian subcontinent in the form of detailed maps and illustrations of heritage sites of India.

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

• 1895 - Upendrakishore first introduced modern block making, including half-tone and colour block making, in South Asia. When the reproduction using woodcut line blocks of his illustrations for one of his books, "Chheleder Ramayan" were very poor, he imported books, chemicals and equipment from Britain to learn the technology of block making. After mastering this, in 1895 he successfully set up a business of making blocks.

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



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

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

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

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
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- 1990's Computers enter Indian Markets leading to blossoming of design firms and private design institutes as well as design departments in the industry owing to market liberalisation.

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Illustration Processes in Detail

• Painting and Stamping on various materials

Prior to any technological advancement, the earlier civilisations relied on painting on materials like leaves, Tree Bark, Fabric, Metal, Ceramic and Plaster of Paris. To make prints clay or wood carved seals and stamps were also used. Metal Stamps were even used for marking clay bricks and imprinting on animals. Stone sculpting was often used to illustrate the zeitgeist of the era and mythological stories on temple walls.

• Woodblock Printing

Woodblock printing is a technique originating in China for printing text, images or patterns on textiles and paper. The technique involves creating a 'relief' of the content onto a piece of wood by carving. The block is carved along the grain of the wood and ink is then evenly spread on the wooden surface. By pressing the flat material against the piece of inked wood, the image is then transferred onto the material. Earlier woodblock printing was used in India to print on textiles. Eg: Bagh Prints. Once paper was introduced, the technique further developed to print large sheets of paper using wooden blocks. For making coloured prints, different blocks are used, each with a different colour. Eg: Ajrak Prints.

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• Illustration as Fine Art (Handmade)

Drawing by hand is the oldest method of creating illustrations. What has evolved so far is mostly innovation of tools to help an artist draw. Highly trained fine artists are commissioned as illustrators to create innovative and original ideas for different mediums and bringing them closer to the masses. Owing to the influence of social media and growing demand for illustration skills, many independent illustrators today make their own artworks and self publish.

• Printing Press

A printing press is a mechanical device that transfers ink to paper in the form of print. It was invented in 1440 by a German goldsmith named Johannes Gutenberg. But printing technology did not reach India till about a hundred years after its invention. The first printing press in India reached Goa, in 1556, from Portugal, as requested by a Goan clergy of Portuguese origin. For a long time, printing was only used to publish bible in vernacular languages to spread missionary work. In 1568, the first illustrated cover page (the illustration being done with the relief technique of woodblock) was printed in Goa for the book Constituciones Do Arcebispado De Goa. Eventually, printing led to a language and literature revolution in the country as it spread from Goa to other parts of the country.

Printmaking

A print or 'chaap' is an impression of an object transferred from one surface to another. Printmaking is the art of creating printed images of original artwork. Due to the existence of different printing techniques printmaking can be artistically explored not just for duplicating artworks done in other mediums but also for creating innovative artwork by using printmaking techniques as a tool for artistic expression.

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

• Digital Illustrations

The method of creating illustrated images using digital tools like computer and mouse along with a software interface is called digital representation technique, the result of which is digital illustrations also known as Computer Illustrations.

• Illustration in Craft

Kalamkari is the art of storytelling with hand painted and printed visuals on a large piece of cloth. These cloth pieces were carried around by groups of singers, musicians and painters called Chitrakattis who moved from village to village reciting the great stories of Hindu mythology. These performers would illustrate their accounts by painting them on the spot using simple tools and organic dyes. The Mughals patronised this art in Golconda, Andhra Pradesh and named the artists 'Qualamkars' who created works of 'kalamkari'.

Mithila painting (also known as Madhubani painting) is the art of painting on cloth, handmade paper and canvas, practiced in the Mithila region of India. Painting is done with simple tools, sometimes even fingers, twigs and matchsticks, using natural dyes and pigments. The graphic style is the most striking quality of these paintings as they are very peculiar in their simple yet painfully detailed geometric patterns and colours. Often depicting rituals such as birth, marriage and festivals and sometimes in moments from daily lives.

Chamba Rumal is the art of embroidered illustrations on a piece of cloth from Chamba, India. The illustration style is influenced by the Pahari style of miniature painting. Silk threads are used on cloth to depict various scenes ranging from famous battles to wedding ceremonies.

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

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State of Illustrators Today

The British opened art schools in India to train artists in European styles of art, who were then employed in British advertising agencies. The job of an 'illustration artist' first emerged during this time since the British extensively wanted to document India. Many famous Indian illustrators emerged from these schools but had an excessive European influence in their work. Seeking an alternative to European influenced art in imperial India, Gagendranath aimed at reviving the inherited wealth of Indian art practices while using modern printmaking techniques. Rabindranath Tagore furthered the cause by establishing Kala Bhawan in 1919. Thus began the era of Indian fine art revival. More artists could now have their work mass-produced as prints and spread across the continent. From there on the students went and learned not only modern reproduction techniques but also nurtured their own Indian Indigenous art practices and Indian fine art Illustrators slowly rose to prominence. Post-Independence Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru pushed the introduction of design in nation-building. With the growing demand for communication and broadcast, various fields of illustration emerged. From architecture to industrial design, filmmaking to books, today skilled illustrators are thriving in India and with them, Indian Indigenous art is also slowly gaining back its prominence.
