Introduction

The city of Lucknow blends royalty, culture and many religions into each other unlike anywhere else. Even while keeping pace with modern developments, it has preserved its golden past and its sublime culture - the Luckhnawi Tehzib.

Mukaish, an almost dying craft of Lucknow, is age-old embroidery where thin strips of metallic wire are inserted into the fabric and then twisted to create metallic embroidery. Very few karigars make exclusive Mukaish sarees as it is mostly done to highlight or adorn heavy Chikankari work. Over time, Chikankari travelled far and wide but Mukaish remained in Lucknow's narrow lanes. The karigars of this craft, also known as Badla in Gujarat and Maharashtra, are a dying breed.



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Place

Being the principal centre of the erstwhile Awadh province, Lucknow, situated on the banks of the river Gomti, is the capital of Uttar Pradesh. This 'golden city of east' is regarded as one of the finest cities of India. Having the most spectacular gardens, palaces, fine architectural mosques and temples, it is synonymous with cultural finesse, social warmth and an enduring love for gracious living. Chowk, as the name suggests, is a street in old Lucknow with the distinction of being the oldest in the city. Most of the Mukaish karigars live and work in the narrow lanes of this area itself.

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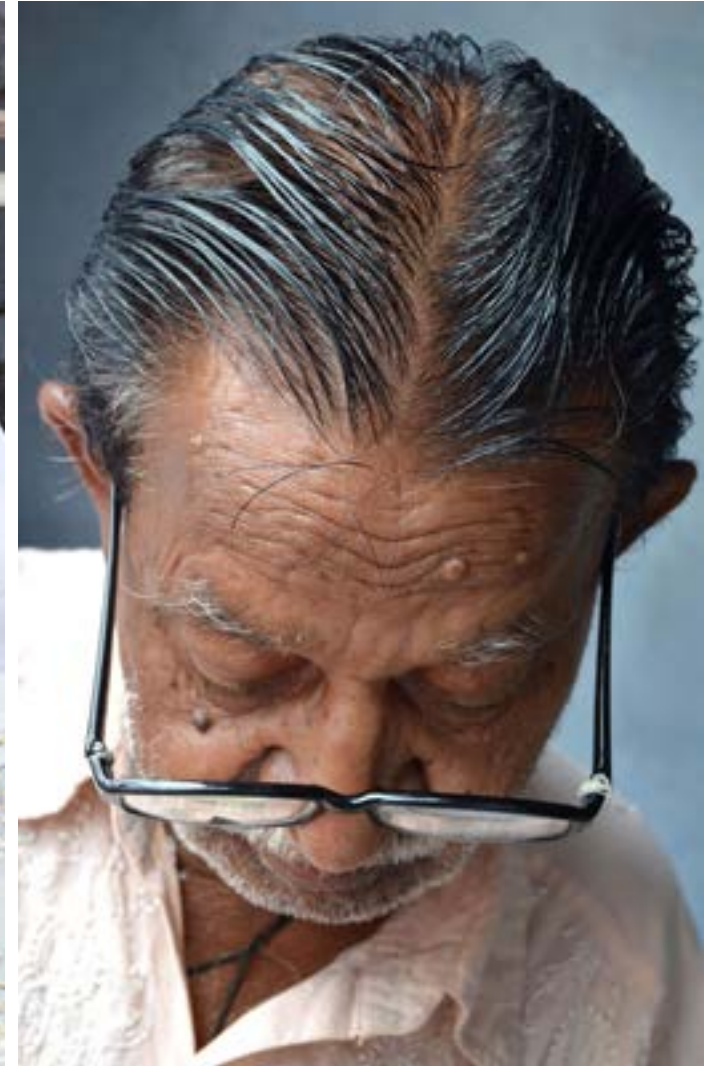

Firstly, the motif or pattern to be embroidered is printed on the fabric (usually a pure chiffon or georgette) with a mix of 'neel' powder and gum. This could be transferred from a perforated paper stencil or block printed.

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Takaayi

In older times, clothes for the royalty were embroidered with silver wires. This got replaced by cheaper metals. Any metal is first stretched into strips that are passed through flames for different colors and cut in fine wires. These are then beaten with a tiny hammer for hours to produce a thin, papery density that can be used to embroider on the fabric.

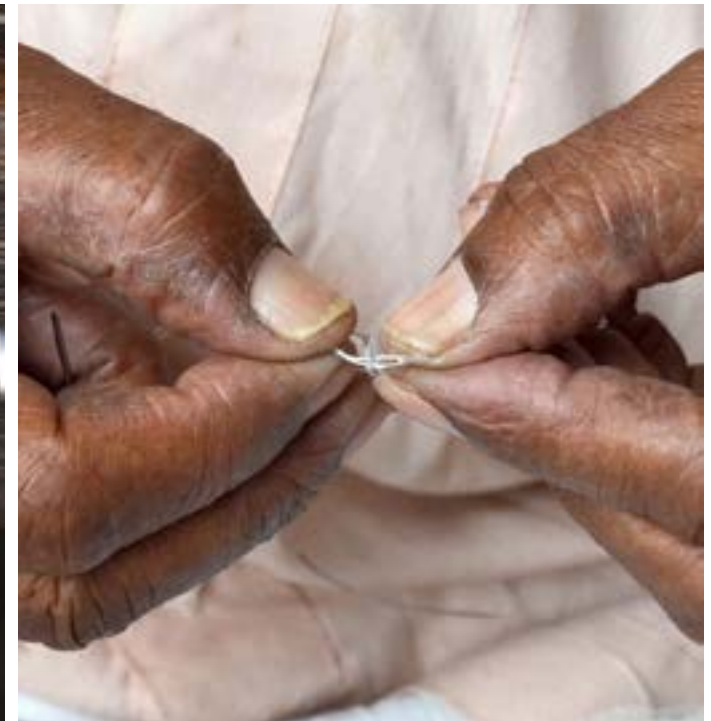
There are two types of Mukaish work namely Fardi Ka Kaam and Kamdani.

• Fardi Ka Kaam:

Fardi, literally meaning dots, is the most basic yet beautiful type of Mukaish work. Dots are stitched in different sizes and patterns. The 'hazaar batti', thousand dots design in Fardi is characteristic of Lucknow. 'Tikki' (flat sequins) and 'challa' (rings) are used extensively to enhance the design. Size of the dot depends on the width of the wire used and is referred to as numbers - point 4 being the larger dot, point 2 smaller, point 1 being the smallest and most expensive dot. Fardi ka kaam is usually done by women from their homes.

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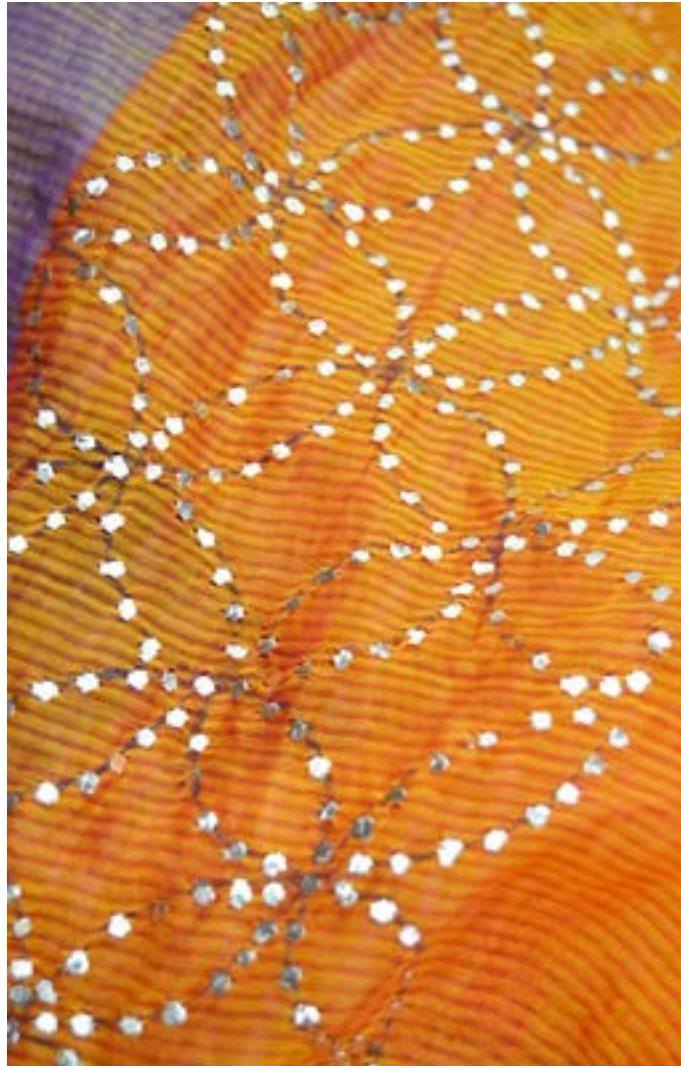

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- **Kamdani:**

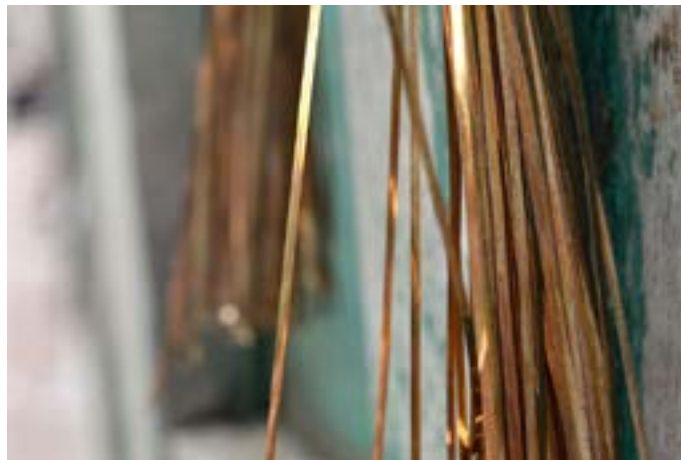
In Kamdani, the wire attached to a small length of thread is pulled through the fabric with a needle, beautifully working into motifs. This is also referred to as 'fancy kaam'. Kamdani is fast becoming a rarity and most of the craftsmen are elderly men.

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Ghutaayi

After the embroidery is done, the fabric is laid flat on a blanket and rubbed over with a cowrie shell or a glass bottle. This flattens and burnishes the wire, also leaving it brighter.

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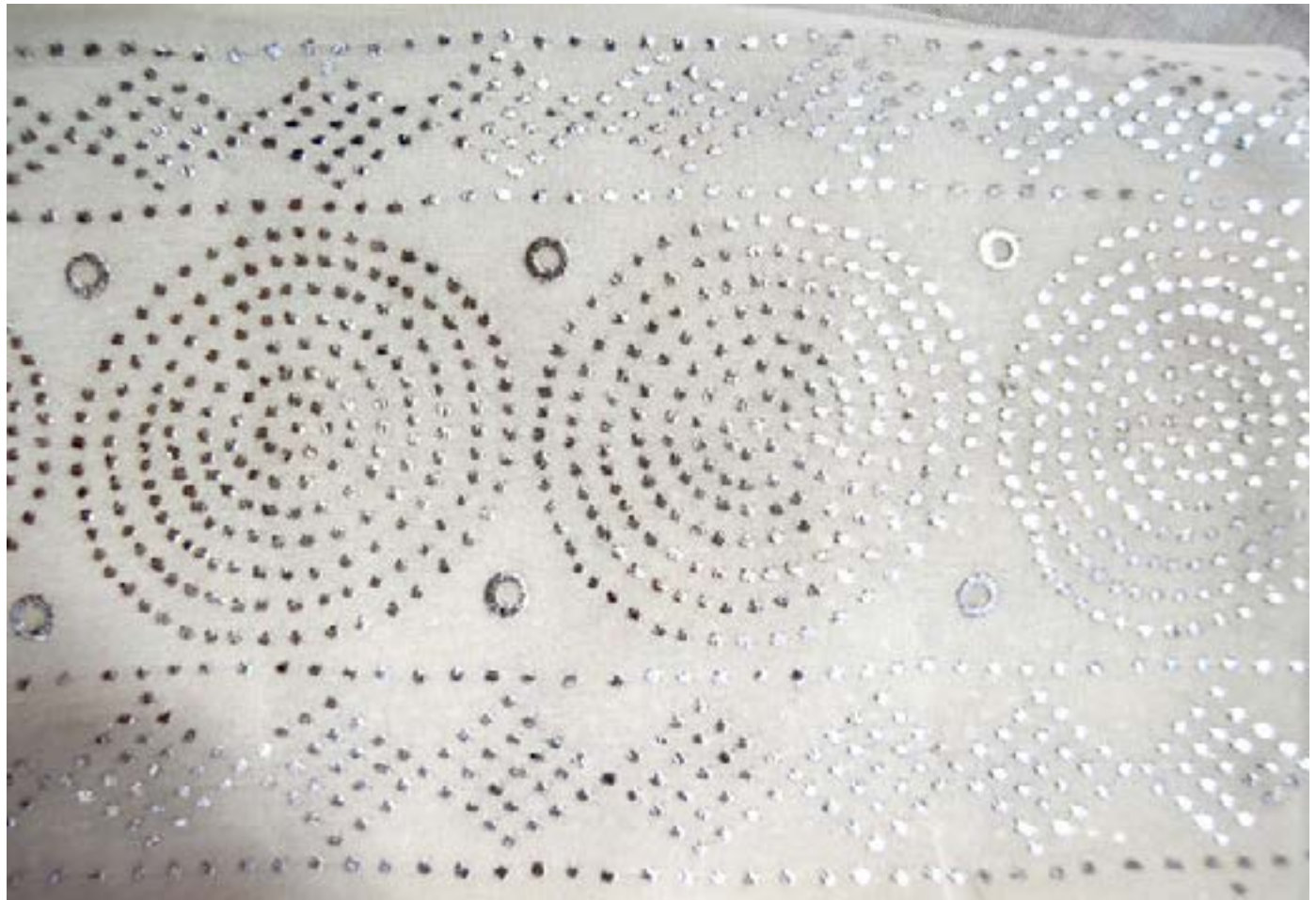
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Products

The craftsmanship of Lucknow karigars is unparalleled. Usually heavy chikan-and-mukaish-work georgette sarees and lehengas are available in white and can be dyed in the color of one's choice. Some designers are also experimenting with different textile weaves and combining it with Mukaish work, sans Chikankari. Kurtis and dupattas are embroidered with multi-color threads as well. Lakhnawi products are exported the world over and are a must for the tourist who visits the city.

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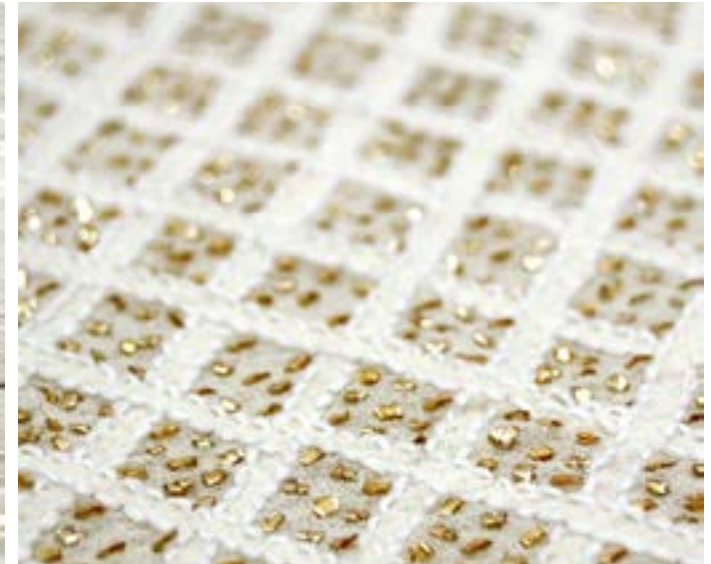
