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# Soap Stone Carving - Mysore The Craft of Soap Stone Carving



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### Introduction

Mysore- the city of palaces is located about 146 km southwest of Bangalore in Karnataka state. Mysore is hub of cultural arts and handicrafts. Famous Mysore painting, Rose Wood inlay and typical Mysore silk sari are world renowned crafts from Mysore. The unique soapstone carving also adds weight to the cultural wealth of Mysore. The history of Soapstone carving in Mysore dates back to many centuries and well patronized by royal kingdoms. Mysore is the center of Soapstone carving due to abundant availability of soapstone deposits, which is available in and around Mysore. H.D.Kote near Mysore is the center for soapstone deposits. Many skilled artisans are engaged in carving soapstone to create fascinating artifacts with graceful expressions. The block of stone is first marked as per the design to be carved and it is carved out using chisels of different sizes to obtain the intricate patterns. Enhanced outlook, Smooth finish and detailed designs are the result of great craftsmanship.

All the carved products mainly used in several religious temples in and around Mysore and also sent to the all over places in India based on the orders. Some of the contemporary art forms are carved based on special requests by the end users. In Karnataka, Shivarapatna and Malur are other major centers for stone carving.

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### **Tools and Raw Materials**

Soapstone locally called as Krishna Shila is the basic raw material available in brown, tan, yellow, red, gray, pink, white and black colors. Soapstone can be easily carved due to its soft nature which consists mostly of lac. Soapstone is soft when it is freshly bought from the quarries; later the stone becomes harder after 2 to 3 years. Rough and detailed carvings are done using small number of tools of different sizes such as hammer, chisels-for fine detailed carving, compass and scale for measuring and few automated drilling/hand drills/tools to create intricate designs on the stone. Metal paste is used to coat the carved idol after smoothening as it helps to enhance the glossy finish of the idol.

#### List of tools used:

- 1. Channi it is used to give shape of the stone while carving.
- 2. Manevali Jumper used to give the sharp detailing on the statue.
- 3. Kaiwara divider used to adjust symmetry of statue.
- 4. Alpas it is used to flatten the shape.
- 5. Kolower uli sharp edgedchisel used to carve the ornaments of an idol.
- **6.** Molomatta Scale is used for scaling purpose.

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## **Making Process**

The highly skilled artist with his great effort makes the art piece by following several steps such as stone cutting, marking, rough carving, detailed carving and final finishing. Fine quality soapstones are procured and stored in bulk. The big block of stone is first roughly cut into proper shape. Then, the proportions are marked on the stone using divider tool. The unwanted stone portion is removed during the carving process. The reference paper with the design is placed on the stone and the design is traced on the stone. Based on the traced design, the shape of the idol is first roughly cut and then carving is done with chisel and hammer. The rough carvings are made first. Once the base shape of idol is revealed, then the detailed carvings are made with sharp edged chisels and jumpers. The idol is rubbed with stone to smoothen the outer surface. Finally, the idol is coated with metal paste to obtain the glossy finish. Different types of traditional products include Images of Lord Krishna with flute, Lord Hanuman, Lord Rama with Sita and Laxmana and Shaneeswara. Contemporary forms also carved based on the market requirement.

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### **Products**

Beautiful stone idols are aesthetically carved by traditional sculptors of Mysore. Rich and intricate carving talks about the traditional carving similar to Hoysala style, Pallya style, Chola style, Rashtrakuta style of carvings. The skilled artisans give life to the stones by carving graceful facial expressions, intricate jewelry designs. Different gestures, poses and the expressions of every idol are unique and typical for their motifs and carvings. Carved images of god and goddess are influenced by Hindu mythologies and epics. Apart from traditional style of carving, the artisans also introduced contemporary form of carving to meet the latest trend. The contemporary art forms are ideal as decorative pieces. Traditional art forms include images of deities like-Lord Krishna, Lord Rama, Lakshmana and goddess Sita, Lord Vinayaka, Lord shiva in the form of Linga. Idols of freedom fighters, saints and some other royal personalities of Mysore are carved as per the customer requirements.
