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Introduction

The richest embroidery in India is the Zari and the zardozi, which is known since the late 16th century. This art form was introduced in India by the Mughal invaders. Zari zardozi is a form of embroidery, which came to India from Persia. Its literal translation, Zar means gold and Dozi means embroidery. Zari zardozi embroidery undergoes the process of using metallic-bound threads to sew on the various products. This skill of embroidering practiced by artisans of early days has passed on this trade among their families and local communities. The Muslim communities residing in India initially executed Zardozi's work. These Zardozi designs vary from place to place.

The states of India, which are involved in the making of zardozi works, are Lucknow of Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, Ujjain of Madhya Pradesh etc. To date, there are numerous micro-enterprises that specialize in Zardozi. It is particularly popular in countries like Iran, Pakistan and India. The Bhopal city of Madhya Pradesh is also one of the places where the traditional way of zardozi is still practiced. This place has great historical experiences, which have their impression on the art and culture of the place. Bhopal has its own unique art and culture with a rich heritage.

Zardozi is a style of embroidery, which has been in India since the time of Ramayana, Mahabharata. The Actual original process of Zardozi is known as 'Kalabatun'. Real gold and silver wires were used enclosed along with the silk threads to decorate satin and velvet fabrics. Along with the threads, other rich add-ons such as sequins, beads, precious and semi-precious stones and pearls were also sewn on. These kinds of embroidered works were used in the Mughal Era by the royalty to adorn tent walls in the form of tapestries and wall hangings, as well as on accessories for elephants and horses.

Artisan Mr Javedh Ali is from Bhopal, who got this unique skill from a Person from Rehti village who had come to Bhopal to teach zari zardozi work. He is practicing this work for the past 25 - 30 years. They get orders from local showrooms in Bhopal, based on the client's requirement they design the fabric and send it to the shop for the final finishing work.

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

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Tools and Raw Materials

The tools that are required for the embroidery:

- Wooden Frame: It is used to fix the plain cloth for stiffness.
- Scissors: It is used to cut the excess thread in embroidery.
- Tracing Sheet: It is used to draw the reference design.
- Kerosene: It is used to mix with the color solution to mix and trace the design on fabric.
- Color Solution: It is used for tracing purposes.
- Needle: It is used to embroider on the fabric.
- Silk Thread: A basic material for hand embroidery.
- Fabric: Cotton, velvet, satin, and silk cloth are used to embroider the required design.
- Sequin Beads: It is used to enhance the design.
- Tailor's Chalk: It is used to draw designs on framed fabric.

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Making Process

The techniques used to create Zardozi are the same across India as the original and ancient techniques. There are main 4 basic techniques:

- 1. Designing is the initial stage of the process of zardozi embroidery on a butter sheet whole design is drawn with a pencil and over the design, holes are made using a needle. In the Mughal period, designs were comprised of complex nature, floral and leaf motifs but in the modern days' contemporary methods with influence, the traditional style patterns are more preferred such as geometric stylizations of similar motifs.
- 2. Tracing the design onto a piece of fabric is done by placing the patterned butter paper on a flat table with the fabric underneath. Kerosene and color solution is mixed together and this solution is then dipped with a wadded cloth, which is then rubbed over the tracing sheet. This allows the ink from the sheet and the design to get discovered over the fabric.
- 3. Wooden frames are then made using bamboo or wooden spars to stretch the design-imprinted fabric. The size of the frame is usually depended on the size of the fabric. It is then stretched out and tightly held to give the cloth a uniform tightness. The artisans then sit around this frame to start the embroidery work.
- 4. Embroidery is then done over the traced design on the fabric using a needle and thread. Over that, it is then embroidered with stone beads using needle and thread. These beads are embroidered by passing the thread both above and below the fabric. It may take a minimum of 3 days to 10 days to complete a design depending on the intricacy of the design and the number of artisans working on a piece.

These embroidery works are then used to make the different products such as sling bags, handbags, men's kurtas and many other different varieties of articles.

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
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Flow Chart:



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
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Initially the outlook and measurements of the final products that is going to be made are sketched on a sheet of paper.



According to the measurement, wooden frame is set and the cloth is fixed to the frame.



Cloth is measured and the markings are made to execute the zardozi work on it.



The detailed design pattern is sketched on the tracing sheet.

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
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The sheet that has a design is placed in appropriate place on the cloth that is fixed to wooden frame.



Later with the help of cotton the kerosene with color solution is wiped on the tracing sheet thoroughly to create the design's impression on the cloth.

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
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

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

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Products

Zari Zardozi's works are very expensive embroidery types because of their intricate work on the fabric. Mr. Javedh Ali from Bhopal, an artisan who has experience of 25-30 years is known for his work on Zardozi says that making zardozi embroidery includes lots of time and experience as it takes a minimum of 3 days to complete an embroidery work of a men's kurta. The price of the zardozi work depends on the size, work and product.

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
